#### **PREFACE**

In the year 1959 on 24<sup>th</sup> January two persons of Nandigram locality, Kshirod Chandra Maity of Dhanyakhola and Benimadhab Pal of Roynagar circulated a printed Handbill convening a meeting on 26<sup>th</sup> January, 1959 of the local persons interested in education to be assembled at a local High School "Nandigram Brajamohan Tiwary Sikshaniketan". They expressed their desire in the call that they wish to establish a Degree College at Nandigram for imparting higher education and like to donate their savings of money for the purpose.

On 26<sup>th</sup> January, 1959 the meeting was held and the two peasants mentioned above donated Rs. 50,000/- each for the establishment of the proposed College. A General Body was formed in the meeting consisting of 53 enthusiastic persons interested in education of the locality and the Hon'ble SDO. The General Body members pledged to contribute Rs. 2/- (Rupees two only) each for making a fund for preliminary works for the establishment of the College.

In the first meeting of the General Body of the proposed Degree College held on 4<sup>th</sup> February, 1959, an interim Governing Body was formed taking SDO of Tamluk Sub-Division as the President and the Sub-Registrar of Nandigram as the Secretary, one Police Officer of Nandigram P.S., three Head-masters of local High Schools, two M.L.A. of Nandigram Assembly Constituency and twelve local gentries.

Afterwards the General Body and interim Governing Body (Ad-hoc) held twelve meetings encouraged and inspired by tremendous enthusiasm of local people. Lands were procured as donation from local people. Constructions were erected to accommodate students in class rooms, teachers' room, laboratories and college office in tiles headed structures. All these were developed with donations of cash, materials and service/labour free of cost from local people.

Finally, on 19<sup>th</sup> July, 1960 the proposed college was accorded affiliation from the University of Calcutta and the Sitananda College, Nandigram began its journey from 21<sup>st</sup> July, 1960. It came under the umbrella of Vidyasagar University from 1985 onwards.

There is an interesting story behind the name of the college. The college got its name 'SITANANDA' from the first part of the name of two principal donors. They are Sitanath Pal, the father of Benimadhab Pal and Ananda Mohan Maity, the father of Kshirode Chandra Maity. 'SITA' of Sitanath Pal and 'ANANDA' of Ananda Mohan Maity are combined together to give a final shape in the name of the college.

The college started functioning initially with two faculties – Arts and Science.

Honours courses were introduced in different subjects in different years like Bengali, Mathematics and Political Science in 1966.In 1991 the college got affiliation in History (Hons.).From 2006-2007 session Education and Chemistry Honours courses and from 2008-2009 Physics Honours course have been introduced.General Courses in Education, Bengali, Philosophy, Political Science, History, English, Sanskrit, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Zoologyhad been introduced from its inception. Anthropology was introduced from the inception of the college and it is also interesting to note that it is the second Anthropology Department at the Undergraduate level in its history in West Bengal. Botany, Geography and Nutritionhave also been introduced. The institute is flourishing rapidly in spite of facing many difficulties and soon going to be one of the premier colleges in the southern region of the state of West Bengal. P G Courses in Bengali, English, Sanskrit and Mathematics are going to be introduced very soon. A new building for it is being constructed.

At present the college office is fully computerized and automated with Internet facilities. The college has four spacious and well-equipped Blocks – Administrative Block, Arts Block, Science Block and Kazi Nazrul Block.

Recently, the Reading Rooms (teachers and Students) of the Library have been refurnished with air-condition facilities. There are six well equipped laboratories, Zoology Museum,Boys' Common Room, Boys' Hostel, three Playgrounds, two Ponds with three Pucca Ghats and Canteen for Teachers and Students. The college, of late, has received a special financial aid from U.G.C for the construction of a three-storied Girls' Hostel which has already been completed and now it is functioning. Construction of three storied Physics Building has already been started under the financial assistance of the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal and a new construction has started on the roof of the old Physics building.

The college is marching forward with success and glory. Presently, it has more than 1550 students and interestingly, girls comprise of the formidable part of it. The college is gifted with a healthy academic atmosphere fostered and nurtured by teachers, students and management of the institution. Moreover, the scenic beauty of the college with its ponds, plants and gardens provide it with an aesthetic look. Peace and happiness prevail upon the idyllic ambience of the academia which gives a sensation of ancient *Topovan* to both the teachers and learners. In the past years the college has produced thousands of promising talents who are now playing significant roles in the reconstruction of an ideal society and a strong, secular and democratic nation. Posterity waits with lighted candles and flowery crowns to welcome the coming days of success towards which the college is steadily marching ahead.

## A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY (CRITERION WISE) AND SWOC ANALYSES

Sitananda College owes its origin to a widespread intellectual movement that swept across Bengal immediately after the Independence and was felt even in the remotest corners of the state. As it happened people of almost all the sections of this remote corner of West Bengal felt the necessity of an institution of higher education that would cater to the needs of the thousands of students passing out of the schools of the locality. The intellectuals came forward to give a concrete shape to the hopes and aspirations of the common people but the latter were not to be left behind in terms of material contribution to the realization of a general hope. The movement was basically started by the intellectuals like Late Dr Probhod kumar Bhowmik, the eminent Anthropologist of international stature, Late Dr Bhola Nath Chandra and Late Bhoopal Chandra Panda. This great ideal was materialized and substantiated by some large hearted people of the society. Late Kshirode Chandra Maity of Dhanyakhola donated the amount of Rs 50000 (Fifty thousand only), Late Benimadhab Pal of Raynagar also donated the amount of Rs 50000 (Fifty thousand only) and late Taraknath Bera of Gadaibalbar donated some acres of land. Moreover, the common people voluntarily contributed with common materials like wood, bamboo etc., physical labour and most importantly keen interest. **SITANANDA COLLEGE** began its odyssey on 21<sup>st</sup> July, 1960 in two stretchy tile-shaded buildings with the affiliation of Calcutta University and subsequently from 1985 under Vidyasagar University.

#### **CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

Sitananda College, Nandigram is an Undergraduate College in Arts & Science and is affiliated to Vidyasagar University, Midnapore, and West Bengal. The college is located in a remote rural area. The college aims at empowering the underprivileged section of the society by imparting quality education to rural people, particularly women, poor and backward class minority students of Nandigram. The College has the objective of enlightening the first generation learners of the socially and economically backward region of Nadigram by offering the opportunities for higher education. It is attempting to empower the students with the necessary knowledge and skill required to meet the challenges of the 21st century job market.

As an affiliated college of Vidyasagar University, it follows the curriculum developed by the respective Board of Studies of the University. It has no autonomy to modify or add new topics to the existing curriculum to meet the changing needs of the economy. The tenure of every Board of studies is of four years; it is observed that the curriculum is revised every <u>five</u> years by the university. One teacher of the College is the member of the Board of studies (U G level) of the University and hence he is playing role in reviewing and redesigning of the courses in his capacity, but some teachers attend workshops conducted by the University for Curriculum Design.

At present the College is offering Undergraduate programs in Arts, Science both in General and Honours courses. The Honours courses are available in Bengali, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Geography, and Education in Humanities, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology, and Anthropology in Science. The University has provided several programme options to the students. The college in time has given scope to the students to choose from as many as twelve (12) Honours subjects and fifteen (15) general subjects to be studied in two streams as stated above. The students enjoy the flexibility to change the subject combinations prior to the process of university registration.

The college has started to receive feedback from 3<sup>rd</sup> yr students and it gives importance to the feedback mechanism.

The goal and objectives of the college are well defined and diligently pursued. The college imparts value based education through language and literature and NSS activities which are mainly community oriented.

#### **CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION**

The admissions in the college are made on the basis of marks based merit and it follows the reservation policy of the Government. The college tries to admit students till the intake capacity is reached as the college is located in remote rural area catering Higher Education to poor, backward, minority students among whom a significant number belong to below poverty line. The academic calendar prepared by the University is followed with a few modifications based on the local needs.

Each department prepares teaching plan to complete the syllabi in time. The Teacher-in-Charge monitors the academic and teaching progress. Teaching and learning methods are more or less conventional but chalk and talk method is supplemented by the use of charts, models, maps, specimens, etc. and audio-visual aids like LCD Power Point Projectors, overhead projectors etc. in the classrooms and by organizing excursions and educational tours for the students in some of the Departments. Examinations are conducted strictly as per the University rules. The students are informed about the method of evaluation, regulations, pattern of questions, distribution of marks and number of papers at the beginning of the term.

At present, the College has 20 Full Time Substantive teaching faculties, out of 27 sanctioned posts and 17 Part Time teachers. All the full time teachers have the requisite qualification as approved by UGC and were appointed by the College Governing Body on the recommendation of West Bengal College Service Commission. The Part time teachers are appointed by the Governing Body on the basis of some definite guidelines of the Government and approved by DPI, West Bengal. The college has deficient number of teachers for which it appoints Guest/Invitee teachers in different subjects as per requirement through the Selection Committees by holding interviews. In the current session, the college appointed such temporary teachers. The teacher students' ratio in the college is 1:28.

The college grants study leave to teachers for higher studies and duty leave for attending seminars, workshops, conferences, etc. It provided in-service training to them through participation in orientation and refresher courses all over the country. The College also

organizes seminars for teachers and students occasionally.

The college has a centralized library with 16659 books, 10 Journals and 2 daily newspapers, one Weekly Employment Newspaper with a Reading Room for free access of students. Internet facility is also available in the Library for students.

#### CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The scope of research for the students is restricted because the college is basically an undergraduate college. However, ample good quality research work is regularly published by the faculty members of the college in several national and international reputed journals. The college provides facilities like internet, computer, well-equipped central library, and partially equipped research mode laboratories to promote research amongst research-minded teachers.

Out of 21 permanent teachers, 6 possess Ph.D. and 3 possess M. Phil degree. Five teachers of the college are working for their Ph.D. Almost all the permanent teachers are engaged in their research work. Governing Body of the college sanctions their study leave without hampering teaching –learning system. College allows the study leaves for teachers to pursue the Ph.D. degree. Some teachers carry out minor research project (MRP) funded by UGC. The college has UGC subcommittee as well as Research subcommittee which help and suggest the teachers to submit proposal for Major and Minor research projects funded by external agencies. One faculty member is engaged in the ongoing project funded by UGC and some faculty members are preparing their proposals for submission.

A large number of full-time teachers regularly participate in Seminars, Conference & Workshops, both at the national and international levels. National seminars, Departmental Seminars organized by different Departments, often funded by the UGC, take place in the college time to time in which distinguished resource persons from different universities present papers targeting mainly the students of this college, expanding the horizon of their knowledge and inspiring them for higher analytical studies & research. Publication of research papers, attendance in the seminar, workshops etc. are encouraged to the faculty members to cope up with the present development of the subject concerned.

Social responsibility and national responsibility are given importance through the extension activities like NSS. Thus the college inspires the students to participate in the extension activities. Presently the college has three NSS units to fulfil the social and national needs of its capacity like community development, health and hygienic awareness, adult education, value education, environmental awareness, literacy programmes, blood donation camp etc.

#### CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The College campus with a total area of 9.85 acre of pollution-free spacious land with everincreasing natural greenery, totally encircled with boundary wall, is fully equipped with several physical and infrastructural facilities. The college has four well-equipped blocks (Administrative block, Arts block, Science block and Kazi Nazrul block) with electricity & water supply, four well-furnished classrooms with sound & over projectors facilities, seven spacious and adequate equipped laboratories, a Zoology Museum, a Telescope, and Computer Laboratory with internet access. Besides, there exist a lot of co-curricular facilities. Some significant facilities are: two big playgrounds having facilities for Football, Cricket, Badminton, Volley Ball, Kabaddy, Basketball and space for indoor games etc.

The college ensures sufficient common facilities such as Students' Canteen, Teachers' canteen with purified drinking water, two vehicle stands, two Big Ponds with three Pucca Ghats, one P.H.E. Pump House, One Generator Room, N.S.S. office, a Garden with Social forest plantation, one deep Tube well and a purified cold water tank.

The college provides sufficient residential facilities for the students. Accommodations are available in the present hostels for both male and female students. Notably, there are Common Rooms with adequate recreation facilities like TV, Indoor Games and Reading Rooms with facilities of News Papers.

Sitananda College possesses an enriched Library with a spacious reading room. The library has almost 16659 books and 10 journals to its credit benefitted the students, teachers, employees of the college and it remains open from 10:30 AM to 5:00 PM for easy access. The Library is fully computerized with assistance in searching database for text and reference books. In Library there is a network resource centre where students can browse net in college hours. Efforts are being made in recent years to enrich the Library providing sufficient space for reading room, conference table and a modest privy.

In Geography department a unit is established in the name of a deceased ex-student "Dipannita Jana memorial Library and Laboratory" with assistance from the parent of that student. It has a stock of core books and reference books of Geography and the parent of deceased student pledge and provides books every year as per requirement of the department.

#### **CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION**

The College publishes its prospectus annually. The prospectus gives details of academic programmes, the fee structure, general rules and the facilities offered to the students. It also presents a brief history of the college. The policies and criteria of admission are made clear to the prospective students through the prospectus and notifications on the college notice board. Courses are completed before the examinations and remedial classes are offered for weak students especially SC/ST/OBC and Minority.

Regarding financial help college has own initiatives in the form of aid fund, free-ships and other incentives. Apart from these, there are different types of government funds. The college offers all sort of help to the students for getting different scholarships such as Swami Vivekananda Merit-cum-Means Scholarship, Sitaram Jindal Trust Scholarship, National Scholarship, Scholarship for Disabled Students, Scholarship from CM, West Bengal, Talent Support Programme (TSP), Government of West Bengal, Merit-cum-Means Scholarship, Central Government and Post-Matric Scholarship, Central Government for

#### SC/ST/OBC/Minority.

Sport and games, other cultural activities are highly encouraged. Students of the institution always have prize-winning performances in those fields. Wall magazines are the platforms where students can express their creative skill. College with its limited capacity framed policies to impart student support by way of establishing carrier counseling cell, canteen, drinking water, lavatory, students' common room for both boys and girls, hostels facility for boys and girls separately. College has an active Students' Union that makes effective link between students and managements. Elected members of the student union are involved in various activities like academic, sports and cultural meet etc. Alumni Association and parent-teacher meetings contribute something positive for institutional development. Through grievance redressal cell students can express their individual view.

#### CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

Sitananda College, Nandigram is governed by an Apex Body which is statutorily called the Governing Body. This body is constituted taking representatives from the Teaching (4 in numbers), Non-teaching (2 in numbers) staff and student (G.S. of the Students' Union) of the College. Two nominees of the affiliating University (Vidyasagar University, Midnapore) are incorporated in the Body. The state Government also nominates two persons to be included in the Body. The sabhapati of the local Panchayet Samity (Statutory local body) is also a member of the Body. The president of the body is to be elected/ selected from amongst these members except student, Teacher and Non-teaching staff members. Anyone outside these representative members may also be co-opted as the president of the Governing Body.

Governing Body takes the highest decision in the matter of policy framing. Committees like finance, academic, building, Provident Fund, Election Commission, Hostel, and Library Committees are formed by the Governing Body. Teachers' Council functions as an academic body and take part in various managerial and administrative activities of the College. Principal/Teacher-in-Charge takes advice of the council. The principal/Teacher-in-Charge acts as the President of the Council. The teachers elect/select one teacher as the Secretary of the Council.

#### **CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES**

Various quality assurance mechanisms have been developed by the institution within the existing academic and administrative systems, for instance, formation of IQAC, setting up of a Career Counselling Cell, etc. The faculty always tries to make the entire teaching-learning process learner-centric. Students also have an active role to play in assuring quality of education being imparted by the institution as they provide feedback on various aspects of the institution. Apart from these, all members of the teaching and non-teaching staff are involved in various academic and administrative activities. Parent-teacher meetings are occasionally held, which also help to evaluate the academic programmes. Various community-oriented programmes conducted by the institution help in personal development of the students.

Merit-cum-reservation policy, transparent administration and admission procedures, financial incentives to students, etc. help the institution to cater to the diverse needs and demands of the students, especially those belonging to the socially and economically weaker sections of the society, who form the majority of the student population. A variety of curricular, co-curricular, community-oriented and social activities help to develop social responsibilities and life-skills among students. Even teachers are continuously encouraged to engage in as much research work and faculty development programmes as possible.

Satisfaction of all the stakeholders concerned is taken into account in order to ensure quality of education being imparted by the institution. A functioning system of addressing students' grievances, i.e., analyzing and acting upon the feedback received from students and other stakeholders is also an important quality assurance mechanism.

All these best practices continuously help the institution to develop in a better manner.

#### CRITERION - I CURRICULAR ASPECTS

#### 1.1. Curriculum planning and implementation.

1.1.1. State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stake holders.

None can progress and develop without education and educational institution. This institution came into being out of the demand of the people of different sections to fulfill the needs of the thousands of students passing out of the schools of the locality. The institution is the brain child of Late Dr. Bhola Nath Chandra, Late Bijoy Krishna Goswami, Late Bhopal Chandra Panda and so on.

Sitananda College is situated in rural area in the district of Purba Medinipur. The institution was established in 1960 under Calcutta University. At present, the College is affiliated to Vidyasagar University, Midnapur. The founding father of the institution took the initiative to realize the vision of the great educationist to enable the students of the adjacent areas of Nandigram to pursue higher education. The vision of the institution is to transform the college into a centre of excellence in the field of higher education. The College still upholds the ideals of its founding fathers with the following vision, mission and objectives.

To achieve excellence in higher education, employment through quality education and knowledge, inclusive and all-encompassing growth for socio-economic changeand sustainable development

To build excellent and brilliant socially responsible citizens and leaders through higher education

#### Mission:

The mission of the institution is:

- To create awareness, conviction and commitment of the students to social and moral values for improving the quality of life through education.
- To create awareness of human rights, value system, culture, scientific temper and environment.
- To impart education with up to date knowledge of latest developments within all fields of human activities and to refinements, enhancements and increase of application of such knowledge to the moral and material progress of man.
- To promote participation of all the stakeholders in the development of institution.

#### **Objectives**:

To achieve this mission our objectives are:

To provide a comprehensive training to achieve the ways of living in a multi-religious, multi-lingual and multi-cultural society successfully

To emphasize all round development like physical, mental/moral and spiritual and to create outstanding personalities in the field of sports and games

To prepare employability skills for job opportunities

To orient students to their social responsibilities through various co-curricular and extracurricular activities such as NSS, various counseling cells, women cell (Vishaka), Human Rights and the like.

All the above vision, mission and objectives of the institution are communicated to the students, teachers, and the stakeholders through the college prospectus, college magazine 'MEGH SARIYE', through various meetings with the students, staff and other stake holders (Teacher's Council, Student's Union, Alumni, Parents and Non-teaching staff of the College and so on) and official website of the institution at <a href="www.sitanandacollege.info">www.sitanandacollege.info</a>. It is also communicated to the students during the Fresher's Welcome Ceremonyof the college. The vision and mission of the college are recollected and reminded by the Principal/TIC during some special occasions and annual cultural program of the college.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example (s).

The curriculum prepared and designed by Vidyasagar University is followed by our College. Whenever there is a change in the curriculum, the University communicates it to the college authority and the same is intimated to the respective department for an immediate implementation of the change. The concerned department informs the students properly. At the beginning of every academic year commencing from July, the heads of all the departments chalk out an academic calendar based on the Academic Calendar sent by the university which includes topics to be taught and lecture hours during the year. The syllabi are distributed among the faculty members of the departments by the departmental heads. Academic diaries are also distributed to the faculty members. They chalk out their teaching plans for the session, to complete the syllabi within the prescribed limited time. The curriculum delivery is effectively done through lectures, supported by Power Point Presentations through LCD Projectors and e-content development. Printed study material is also given to the students. This is supplemented by Group Discussions, Seminars and Interactive sessions. If, for any reason, a faculty fails to finish his/her syllabi within the time limit, he/she arranges special and extra classes.

The students regularly consult the teachers to solve the subject problems and E-learning facility. INFLIBNET service is made available for the faculty and students to further ensure effective delivery of curriculum. The quality of education imparted to students is monitored and ensured through Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The quality of education imparted to students is evaluated by the IQAC and necessary remedial measures are incorporated in the future. A feedback system from the student side is made for understanding the effective delivery of the curriculum. The faculty members follow different methodologies like classroom teaching, seminars, project work, quiz, group discussion, debates etc., for an effective implementation of curriculum.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the university and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching effective translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

As the college is affiliated to the Vidyasagar University, it follows the University framed and designed curriculum. At the beginning of the session, the University sends an Academic Calendar in the College. In accordance with this, the institution prepares an academic calendar that specifies the curriculum to be taught by a teacher. The commencement of date and time of internal examinations are also sent. The College receives regular letters, circulars and e-mails from the University, concerning the changes or modification in the curriculum. The principal/TIC of the institution duly informs the concerned teachers of the department about the change and gives them a copy of the same. Thus the teachers receive all sorts of help and support from the University.

Whenever the University implements new pattern of the syllabi, the University organizes workshops on each and every discipline for effective implementation of the curriculum for the teachers. The University duly informs the head of the institution to encourage the teachers to participate in such workshop.

The faculty members of the institution are allowed to purchase books, journals, reference books of their subject as per their requirement. They can also avail the facilities available in the institution such as computer, internet, photocopy, printing, scanning etc.

## 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The Institutional Academic Calendar has the detailed programme for the lesson plans for every subject of Honours, General and compulsory. The progress is monitored regularly by the head of the department to facilitate effective delivery of curriculum and transaction of the curriculum provided by the affiliating university. The respective departmental heads submit workload before the commencement of the session based on which time-table is prepared. Moreover the college ensures that Test & Evaluation is carried out from time to time by way of class tests. The college facilitates the development of cognitive skills such as problem solving, critical analysis, evaluation and synthesis by implementing Academic Calendar and schedule of work and organizing interdisciplinary and interdepartmental programmes. Field studies/visits, surveys, case studies and excursions including industrial visits and project works ensure the development of skills.

Syllabi have provision for Information and Communication Technology (ICT) oriented courses in Mathematics and Physics. Efforts are also made to sensitize and create awareness of the need for Information and Communication Technology in education by the different departments of the institution. Moreover some class rooms of the college building are furnished with audio system. Computer and Internet access is also provided to some of the departments so that faculty members can keep themselves updated in their respective subjects.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

For quality improvement, the college students are given exposure to the field.Regular field visits are organized by the departments for imparting first hand practical knowledge to the students.

The college constantly keeps in touch with its affiliated university. Regular formal meetings of Board of Studies conducted by the university and informal meetings of the department throughout the academic session help the faculty members to keep themselves touch with the latest trends in their fields of study. Sometimes the university teachers are invited for discussions and for professional interactions with the faculty members. Moreover many new things are learnt and also communicated by our faculty members during the meetings of Board of Studies in the university. Apart from these, most of our faculty members participate in seminars, workshops and conferences at state, national and international levels. The participants developed themselves their abilities for curriculum development and its effective operationalisation. The college collaborates with other institutions and the university in organizing seminars and workshops which directly or indirectly address the curriculum.

1.1.6. What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/ departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, and stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)

The college is an affiliated institution and hence cannot design and frame the curriculum. The college has to follow the curriculum framed by the university. Generally the curricula are framed by the UG Board of Studies of different subjects and approved by the Academic Council of the Vidyasagar University. Some faculty member of our institution is selected as the member of the UG Board of Studies. For example: Himansu Hazra, Assistant Professor, member of the UG Board of Studies, Vidyasagar University.

Many other members of the UG Board of Studies take active part in framing, modifying and implementing the syllabi of the degree courses. Whenever the university organizes workshops and seminars on curriculum, the faculty members in different capacities from different colleges are invited to attend it where information and feedback for appropriate inclusion is also discussed. They make significant contribution to the curriculum design.

1.1.7. Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? No other curriculum is designed/framed by the institution.

## 1.1.8. How does institution analyse/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The main objective of the institution is to impart higher and quality education to all sections of the society of the surrounding area irrespective of caste, creed and gender. Opportunities

are provided to the weaker and economically backward classes of the society. Meritorious and minority students are provided with scholarships of state and centralgovernment. Physically challenged and Biri workers are also provided financial help/scholarship. Under Kannyasary Scheme of West Bengal Government, girls are given some financial help for their higher studies.

The teachers of this college particularly the department of **Sanskrit** impart significant value based education to the students to inculcate moral values among them through classroom teaching and interaction with them.

The feedback on teachers, curriculum, performance and university results, top ranks obtained by the students at the university level, participation in various cultural and sports activities are taken. Feedback from parents of the students, alumni and many others are also taken. On the basis of these, valuable suggestions are given to the teaching faculties.

Moreover the institution constantly tries to develop the all-round development of the students through various extracurricular activities such as cultural programmes, sports and health awareness through NSS unit of the college. Besides the teaching and learning process, the institution undertakes many activities like community-oriented programmes and collecting relief funds in time of social needs and requirements to fulfill its social responsibilities and obligations.

#### Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses:

A student admitted to a particular course is permitted to change the subject/course within a stipulated time on payment of fees as fixed by the affiliated University. UG programme/course of 3 years duration has to be completed within 7 years of admission by a student. The College offers Undergraduate Programmes in Arts & Science. The University allows the students who fail to qualify in one general subject out of three in Part I Honours and General courses to sit for the next degree (Part II) and at the same time reappear and qualify in the subjects which they had failed to qualify in the previous examination. All these measures prevent year loss of the students.

**Enrichment courses:** The curricula are designed/framed by the Boards of Studies of the Vidyasagar University. There is no scope for the College for course enrichment as such. The College facilitates innovative teaching-learning process through seminars/workshops based on the curriculum, audio-visual mode of teaching, study tour/excursion/field-work, project-work, survey-work, up-gradation of ICT based learning resources, use of library and modernization and up gradation of laboratories.

1.2.4. Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If yes, list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Sitananda College offers Geography (a self-financing course) as an elective subject for B. A /B. Sc Honours and General Courses. The admission procedure is the same as other degree courses offered following the University rules and the curriculumframed by Vidyasagar University.

There are some other courses such as Zoology (Hons), Physics (Hons), Chemistry (Hons), English(Hons), Education (Hons), Sanskirit(Hons) and Nutrition (G), are self-financing. The Annual Course Fee of these courses is decided by the Governing Body of the college.

1.2.5. Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Sitananda College is located in a remote area of Purba Medinipur District and most of the students are of underprivileged class. Apart from these, a number of students come from schedule caste, OBC, and minority community. They require special care and attention and some special skill development programmes are essential. The institution is grateful to UGC for financial support to set up Remedial Course for improving the aforesaid communities. This is quite useful for such backward students to get them prepared and accept the challenges of competition in the employment market.

Computer Laboratory of Mathematics Department, as the curriculum of the subject is integrated with Information and Communication Technology which equips the students to compete in the global employment markets.

No creature in the world can speak like a man and a man can develop this quality and ability through different languages and literatures. The study of Bengali, English and Sanskrit literatures develops four basic skills—listening, reading, writing and speaking and it will serve the purpose of effective communication without which a man is no more than an animal. Hence the study of Humanities and Social Sciences inculcates the core values of life to the students like honesty, charity, truth, sincerity, mercy, nobility, loyalty, courage, and other basic significant values without which the world would become barbaric and meaningless. In the market of employment all these values and skills are highly essential.

1.2.6. Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

Higher education for economically weak, dropped-out students from the general courses & adult earning students may be provided through Distance Modes of Education like the Netaji Open University. The Vidyasagar University provides for the flexibility of combining the Conventional and Distance Modes of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice. The college is yet to open such type of institution.

#### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

Keeping in view of our vision, objectives and courses which are not available in any other colleges in and around 40 km radius are offered in our college. Since the curricula for different courses are framed by the Boards of Studies with the approval of the Academic Council of the Vidyasagar University, this affiliated college has to abide by and adopt these curricula. The entire programmes organized in the college are integrated with the objectives of the college and as per university guidelines.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The college has no right to modify and enrich the curriculum; some indirect effort could be made to optimize the curriculum as has been desired by students. The institution takes several measures to make its proper implementation.

1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The institution is highly conscious of its responsibility in integrating the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum designed and framed for all subjects.

- The college is coeducational and it is highly sensitive to issues related to women- both students and staff. The college has various types of cells related to gender issues. The cells try to protect and provide their dignity, safety and security in the college campus.
- ❖ The college organises Seminars/Workshops on the Gender and environmental issues. Environmental studies are a compulsory subject for all third year students of UG to make them aware of environmental issues. Our college possesses a beautiful green campus which keeps the environment fresh and pleasant.
- ❖ The institution celebrates International Women's Day and World Environment Day to make the students aware of the significance of green environment and gender issues.
- ❖ The institution has provided ICT based class rooms to deliver the lectures. Almost all science departments have been provided with computers and internet facilities.

## 1.3.4. What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

*Moral and Ethical Values:* Moral and Ethical Values are cultivated and inculcated through different activities – NSS program, seminar on communal harmony and secularism, Fresher's welcome, Blood Donation Camps.Psychological Counseling Cell supports students with advice and also underlines the significance of values in life.There held talks of renowned personalities time to time for the development of scientific temper and attitude.

**Employable and life skills:** Training and communication skills, personality development, computer knowledge and training etc. are needed for better employment. Recently the college has provided these facilities to be employed.

**Better Career Options:** The institution has a Career Counseling cell for students' absorbents and for this purpose; Employment News is subscribed and kept it in the Central Library of the College. Important news of job opportunities are displayed on the Notice Boards of Students' Union and the College office.

**Community Orientation:** The institution has three NSS units and its volunteers participate in extension activities to serve the community of the adjoining areas. They organize different types of awareness programmes and create a sense of social responsibility among the community members. At various NSS programmes communal harmony is always emphasized among the students and staff of the college.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The college has a mechanism to receive feedback on curriculum enrichment from stakeholders under the guidance of IQAC.

Feedbacks are collected from the final year of UG students of the college concerning curriculum. The feedbacks collected from students are analysed and taken into consideration for the enrichment of the curriculum. Though the college has no opportunity to design and frame the curriculum but indirectly it influences through the members of the Board of Studies.

Feedbacks from teachers, students, alumni and parents are collected in different meetings and at various occasions for future development of curriculum. On the basis of these feedbacks, suggestions and views are analyzed by the IQAC of the college and other bodies. Then finally an appropriate measure is taken.

### 1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The quality of enrichment programmes is monitored by the apex body of administration like Governing Body and IQAC. The programmes are checked and evaluated by them. The Academic council monitors and evaluates academic matters. Feedbacks from the stakeholders help in monitoring and evaluating the quality of the enrichment programmes. Performance of the students in Internal Assessments and attendances of students are monitored by their respective departmental Head. Moreover, departmental seminars/workshops organised by the different departments always help the quality enrichment.

#### 1.4. Feedback System

## 1.4.1. What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The institution is an affiliated college to the Vidyasagar University and the college cannot have its own curricular designof its own. The syllabi for UG programme in different courses are prepared by the Board of Studies. Faculty members of almost all departments of the college take part in workshops and seminars on curricular design when the same are arranged by the affiliating university and provide their valuable inputson revision of curriculum. he university authorities, sometimes, ask for the opinion of the Governing Body and Teachers' Council regarding the framework of the curriculum. The college sends their opinion on the same. But the design and development of the curriculum is in the hands of the university only.

## 1.4.2. Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'Yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes / new programmes?

There is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on issues related to curricular content and design. Feedback is taken from each student regarding quality of teaching, the curriculum coverage, infrastructural facilities, administrative facilities etc.

Students' feedback is taken from the 3<sup>rd</sup> yr college students only when the students have developed their mature opinion about the implications of the syllabus. The feedbacks thus obtained are well discussed in different bodies like Teachers' Council and the IQAC and presented in the form of recommendations to the Governing Body which takes a final decision on the issues taking all related matters into consideration. A major criticism appears in certain cases, which can directly be related to the temporal administrative lacuna or the syllabi. The curriculum feedback is communicated to the University and even the stake holders.

1.4.3. How many programmes / courses were introduced by the institution during last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

#### One new program has been introduced.

Nutrition (General) has been introduced for the session 2015-16. The introduction of this subject is directly related to the demand of the local society. The subject is highly job oriented as it has been taught at HS level.

#### **CRITERION II**

#### TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

#### 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

## 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

**Publicity:** The College has been working to serve the purposes of higher education for the last 56years; the College is well known and has a good reputation among the people. The College ensures wide publicity in a planned manner. Admission notification is displayed on the College Notice Board. The notification contains detailed information about number proggrammes/ courses, eligibility, process of admission and academic support facilities. The same information is also available on the college website: <a href="https://www.sitanandacollege.info">www.sitanandacollege.info</a>. Relevant information regarding the infrastructure, admission procedure, eligibility criteria, fee structure, scholarships and other activities is conveyed through the prospectus. The prospectus is circulated to the students at the time of admission.

**Transparency:** The College follows Academic Calendar provided by the affiliating University, Vidyasagar University, Midnapore, mentioning last date for receipt of application. The complete list of applicants according to merit is hosted on the website. The selected candidates' lists are displayed on the notice boards as well as hosted on the College website, indicating reservation category too. The selection is made through Admission Sub-Committeeduly constituted by the Governing Body of the College which includes Teaching and Non-Teaching members. Thus, transparency is ensured from the stage of notification till the completion of admission process. Hence access, equity and social justice are ensured through transparency and adherence to rules.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The college offers only undergraduate courses – B.A & B.Sc (Hons & Gen). The criteria for admission are pre-determined by the Vidyasagar University (affiliating University) on the basis of which the *Admission Sub-Committee* of the college conducts the admission of students to various programmes. *The Teacher-in-Charge, Bursar, all departmental Heads, the Secretary of the Teachers' Council, some senior teachers and non-teaching members of the college comprise the Admission Sub-Committee.* As per the directives of the Vidyasagar University, online application is invited. A merit list is prepared and uploaded in the college website. The merit list is prepared on the basis of marks obtained in Higher Secondary or equivalent examination. The college admits the students solely on the basis ofmerit. The Counselling Team helps the students to make the choice of the subjects. In case there is a vacancy in the first list notified, a second list is prepared and displayed and the admission process is continued upto the last date of admission as prescribed in the Academic Calender of Vidyasagar University. The College also follows the reservation policy of the Government of West Bengal.

The College offers three year undergraduate degree courses in the Humanities and Science streams. Honours and General level courses are taught in different subjects of whom affiliations have been obtained from the Vidyasagar University as well as the Calcutta

University (before 1986).

The subject combinations are published in each year's prospectus. The eligibility criteria are also mentioned in the prospectus. The college tries to admit students following admission procedure properly. The college is located in remote rural area catering Higher Education to poor, backwardclasses, minority students among whom a significant number belong to below poverty line.

As to the Vidyasagar University, students seeking admission in B.A./B.Sc. Honours courses must have to obtain 45% of marks in aggregate or 50% of marks in the respective subject in the Higher Secondary or Equivalent Exam. In B.A./B.Sc. General Courses, however, all having pass marks 30% in the Higher Secondary or equivalent Examinations are eligible to apply for admission.

Keeping in view the University directive, the Admission Committee of the college decided upon the following norm for admission in the academic session, **2015-2016**:

#### **Eligibility Criteria for Admission**

- For B. A. (Gen): Candidates must have passed 12th standard with minimum 30% marks.
- For B. Sc.(Gen): Candidates must have passed 12th standard with minimum 30% marks.
- ➤ For B.A.(Hons): Candidates must have passed 12th standard with minimum 45% marks in aggregate or 50% marks in the respective subject.
- For B.Sc. (Hons): Candidates must have passed 12th standard with minimum 45% marks in aggregate or 50% marks in the respective subject.

## 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process.

Yes. Our college has a mechanism to review the admission process and student profiles in the meeting of the Admission Sub-committee which monitors the entire admission process. After completion of the admission process, required data are collected subject-wise and thereby the same are reviewed by the said committee to make it error-free as far as possible. The outcome of the meetings of the committee is added in the prospectus as additional information to make the admission process more students-friendly. At the time of review the experience of the admission process of the previous years is also taken into consideration.

In addition to that the student profiles are reviewed from the feedback obtained from the concerned departments also. Thus, the emphasis is always put on the qualitative improvement in the admission process.

#### **Outcome:**

The faculty can conceptualize about the merits and abilities of the admitted students and they may suggest them for change of subjects. They also advise them to take remedial measure.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

Since our college is located in a rural area; so they are belonging to socially and economically backward background. The college ensures equity and justice for all eligible candidates.

To increase/improve access for admission of the following categories of students is one kind of demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion as follows:

- \* SC/ST: SC 22%, ST 6%: As per the existing West Bengal Govt. Laws for reservation is provided SC/ST students. They also avail scholarships and benefits like fee waiver etc. as per the Govt. and/or college authority as the case may be.
- \* **OBC** Students belonging to OBC-A and OBC-B Category, 4% and 3% of total seats are reserved respectively.
- \* Women Women are not discriminated from men. Both male and female students get equal access and opportunity. Separate hostel facilities are available for women.
- \* **Differently abled:** As per the state policy reservations and other facilities are provided to the physically challenged students.
- \* **Economically weaker sections:** Students from economically weaker sections (especially BPL card holder) get benefit of fee concession and scholarships on producing documents from authorities.
- \* **Minority community:** Students from this community get scholarship from Govt. and several Minority Development and welfare schemes.
- \* Any other: Students from economical weaker family and background can get concession in admission fees. Tuition fees and several Aids from the studentsunion's fund on application and scrutiny of their demand by the faculties approved by the college authority.

### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

## 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- Differently-abled students in the department are identified after admission by the teachers, where after their area of difficulties or weaknesses are also addressed.
- In order to solve their problems, there are interactions which cater extensively to their academic needs.

## 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The College is well aware of the needs of the students. A class has a mixture of intelligent and average students. We admit students of all calibres in line with the objective - EDUCATION FOR ALL. In order to satisfy their queries, the college ensures that the teachers are available to answer their doubts.

Apart from this, at the beginning of the programme, an interaction program (formally called 'Fresher's Welcome') is centrally organized by the Students' Union in presence of Teacher-in-Charge and faculty members. The assessment of the students' knowledge and skill is made department-wise, not centrally. The Head of the Departments or some senior teachers of the departments advise the students about the programme/ course chosen, the examination pattern, the marking pattern, and other such relevant things at the beginning of the programme.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/ Remedial/ Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.

The college is located in remote rural area. This has led the students to an economic and psychological backwardness. This backwardness leads to lack of confidence as compared to the students of other colleges located in big cities. This disparity has to be bridged. For this the college conducts remedial classes for SC/ ST/OBC/Minority students of different subjects to enhance their skills and competence. Enrichment programme like personality development programme also conducted to improve students' personality and motivate them for an innovative and creative mindset. Where ever a retarded learner is identified by the class teacher, the institute deputes a teacher to help him/her with counseling and intensive coaching.

## 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college co-educational institute sensitizes its staff and students regarding the inclusion such as gender, ragging etc. The authority creates awareness to maintain and sustain the environment of the institution with strict rules and regulation. Wide publicity is made regarding this matter. Apart from this, the college offers the Environmental Education as a compulsory subject.

## 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution identifies advanced learners through –

- Classroom performance
- Marks obtained in Internal Assessment taken periodically

- Interaction with the teachers within and outside the classroom
- Home assignments given and assessed
- Conducting Field work and intensive tours in rural and natural areas and environments.

They are supported in the best possible manner. The teachers take extra worl load in helping them with an additional and personal interest. They are provided with the extra-time, advanced learning materials and assistance. Further such learners are motivated for higher seats of learning and top most career options.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The institution collects and analyses the information on the academic performance of all the students by evaluating them after each Internal Assessment taken periodically and sendsthe massages to the parents/guardians about the attendance and percentage of marksof students to check the drop out. For slow learners, extra and remedial classes are held to enhance their skill and knowledge.

### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

#### **Academic Calendar:**

The academic calendar is sent to the college by the affiliating university to be followed in totality. The same academic calendar is published in the College prospectus, Teachers' Diary and the college website before the beginning of the session of every academic year. It provides academic plans for students and teachers. All the teachers and non-teaching staff of the college are provided with a small Diary containing the Academic Calendar, necessary phone nos. and other important information.

### **Teaching Plan:**

Department-wise teaching plan is prepared at the beginning of each academic session systematically. The syllabus of each subject is finished before the Final University Examination. The students are also informed about the teaching plans of individual teacher over the academic session.

### **Time Table:**

The Academic Committee of the College prepares a Master Routine at the beginning of every academic session for regular lectures (theoretical & practical) of all the departments of the college. On the basis of the Master Routine each department prepares its own departmental routine, indicating classes of individual teacher. A copy

of the departmental routine is submitted to the Principal/ Teacher-in-Charge.

#### **Examination Schedule:**

The dates and time schedule for internal tests are given to the students by the teachers concerned. The schedule of the University Examinations is notified by the University in due time.

#### **Evaluation Blueprint**:

Model answers are given to them so that they can perform better in the University examinations. The dates of evaluation of answer-scripts and publication of results of Final examinations are made by the University.

### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been formulated by the Governing Body of the College as a quality tool to maintain and sustain the quality parameter for the various academic and administrative activities of the college. It also helps to improve the teaching learning process by introducing the latest learning Aids. It promotes the research and consultancy.

It also ensures timely, efficiently and progressive performance of academic and administrative tasks.

This cell monitors the matter of promotion, implementation and continuous improvement of innovations in Curriculum, Co-curricular and Extra-curricular activities of the institution. The IQAC works towards the enhancement of the learner's knowledge and personality. This cell also assesses the performance and quality of teachers and recommends measures for betterment of teachers' scholastics and their carrier advancement.

## 2.3.3 How learning is made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The college offers a lot of support services to its teachers for making student centric learning. The college provides a well stocked library which boasts of latest books and journals which the faculty uses efficiently to provide comprehensive and latest information to the students. Students are also encouraged to use the library independently that enhances their knowledge. Apart from these, various competitions like cultural, academic etc. are organized by the departments and the Students' Union in every academic session to enhance the skills of the students in different spheres of activity and make them more confident for the future. The college also encourages the staff and students to use of internet and computers to keep them updated in their respective fields of studies.

## 2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The institute concentrates on the students for making them critical thinkers. To give effective learning experiences to the students, innovative teaching learning method and the modern teaching Aids are used in the class room. Educational tours are arranged by different departments under the guidance of the teachers. Books, Journals, periodicals in Central Library and its use play an important role in teaching learning process. Free internet surfing is allowed to the students in the Computer Lab and the College Library. The entire above academic programmesare student-centric and transform them into lifelong learners and innovators. The college encourages the students to observe the National and International Day/Year like International Literacy Day, Teachers' Day, Independence Day, Republic Day, and College Foundation Day with speeches, symposium & cultural functions. These enable the students socially conscious.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The college as one of the oldest general degree college provides the following modern technologies and facilities for effective learning experience of the students.

- Free internet with Broad Band system is available for teachers and students.
- The college has its own LCD projector, digital class room facilities which are frequently used for imparting lessons.
- ♣ Museum and scientific gallery visits are organised some departments for live demonstration of textual contexts.

## 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The faculty members are allowed to attend and submit their papers in the internal, state/national/international level seminars. The students participate inter college quiz and sports competition and expose their capability round the clock. College also conducts lectures and seminars by experts on various issues in which faculty members and students are encouraged to participate and get benefits. The teachersparticipatein refresher and orientation courses. Educational tours are also conducted. Over the past few years the faculty has been participating in the conferences and presenting papers in national and international level seminars.

## 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/mentoring / academic advise) provided to students?

Miss Ronita maity of Political Science of Part-I has secured first class marks in the session 2015-16 and Mr Santanu Maity of the same year secured 1<sup>st</sup> class marks. A significant number of students of the Collegesecure 1<sup>st</sup> class in every academic session.

Some of our students of different Departments have secured first position in the Vidyasagar University in the session 2015-16and 60% of students have been regularly securing more than 50% marks in their final Examinations. These achievements of students are as a result of constant counselling and guidance by our faculty. In addition to this, the college teachers really act as a true friend, philosopher and guide for the students. Boarding and lodging arrangement for students are made. Thus students find alternate of home in the college premises. Teachers often suggest them for their right choice of career and boost them up for appearing in competitive examinations for securing job like SSC, PSC and WBCS examinations.

## 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Our College has well equipped classrooms. Along with traditional chalk and talk method of teaching, different tools are used for effective learning experience. Charts, models, maps, specimens etc. are used in both humanities and science subjects. PowerPoint presentations with the help of overhead LCD projectors are held regularly. Students have access to the internet facility in the Computer Lab of the college. Library reading room of the college has internet facility for the students and teachers.

### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The Library resources are the key resources to use for the augment of the teaching learning process. The college has a Central Library. Books, journals, reference books etc. are issued from library circulation section to the students and the faculty as and when required. The 'SOUL' Software developed by INFLIBNET has been installed in the year 2006 and since then the library has been rendering services to the students and teachers. In addition to the Central Library, some departments have a departmental library for reference. The Central Library provides the following current information for the students and the faculty

- OPAC services
- New Arivals
- Useful Journals and Periodicals
- N LIST E-Resources
- Faculty publications

The catalogues of different publishers are supplied to the different departments so that they can order for books after consultation with departmental members. Almost all the faculty members have their personal collection of books and they share the books and journals with the colleagues and students. In Geography department a unit has been established in the name of a deceased ex-student "Dipannita Jana" memorial. Efforts are being made in recent year to enrich the departmental library. It has a stock of core and reference books of Geography and the parents of deceased student pledge and provide books every year as per requirement of the department.

## 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college plans the time frame of the lesson plan as per the university curriculum and the teachers complete the syllabus within the stipulated time period. If it is unfinished; the teachers organise special classes out of the routine schedule.

### 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The quality teaching and learning process is monitored by the Teacher-in-Charge and the IQAC. The feedback is taken from the students as well as from the faculty in every interval. Internal assessment tests are regularly held and the results are assessed in the meeting of the Teachers' Council. The Teachers' Council identifies the loopholes and lacunas and suggests measures to be taken and requests the Principal/TIC to take proper steps to rectify it.

### 2.4 Teacher Quality

## 2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The faculty members are selected through the West Bengal College Service Commission. The minimum qualification of faculty members is 55% marks in Masters and qualify in NET/SET Exams or Ph.D. degree as per UGC norms. A centralized panel is prepared by WBCSC after interview. The recommended candidates are appointed by the Governing body of the college.

The College authority also appoints some invitee teachers in different departments as per requirements.

University calendar is followed for the teaching learning process and teaching plan is prepared accordingly. The college provides necessary infrastructural support for using different tools and technology like computer, ICT enable classroom, overhead LCD projector, white screen and board, Internet with Wi Fi etc. Some faculties of the college are very much acquainted with the system and they actually provide informal training to other faculty of the college to make/get them acquainted in using such modern technology.

### **❖** Handling new curriculum

The institution strictly follows the guidelines of the curriculum of the Vidyasagar University framed by the UG Board of Studies. UG Board of Studies plays a vital role in framing new curriculum. Sometimes a workshop is organised by the University and the teachers of different colleges are invited to participate and to discuss on the curriculum.

### **Selection**, development and use of enrichment materials

The faculties of the institution are aware of selecting and developing study materials from enriched learning resources like research journal, valuable references, internet, E-resources etc. Faculties are also deputed to participating relevant seminar, workshop and conferences to enable themselves competent in teaching.

#### **Assessment**

There is a system of self assessment reflecting performance of the faculty in the area of academic, administrative and extension activities which are necessary for the placement/ promotion. The Principal/TIC also submits a confidential report regarding the performance of the faculty and due weightage is given on this report for career advancement/promotion of the faculty.

A seminar on Environmental and HIV awareness are conducted by NSS unit. An awareness & detection programme on Thalasemia was organized by Anthropological Survey of India (ASI), Kolkata

### **Teaching learning material development, selection and use**

Teachers of our college are given free access to internet. This helps them to collect learning material from the internet. College has a well developed library which contains 16659 books and 10 journals of various subjects. Besides this, college organizes seminars and workshops which provide a learning resource to the faculty. Need based assistance for purchasing books and visit to another library of eminent institution are facilitated the faculties to collect learning materials for selection and development.

## 2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

The college has formed a Research Sub-ommittee to facilitate and promote research activities in the different departments of the college. Teachers are supported to receive research grants from UGC and other academic bodies, and four of our teachers have completed their Minor Research Projects funded by the UGC. Five of our teachers are engaged in doctoral research. The Teacher-in-Charge and three teachers have already received doctoral degrees. A teacher has completed her post doctoral project from France. The college facilitates research activities and encourages teachers to attend and present papers in seminars and conferences. A few of our faculty members have published their works in reputed journals and three of them have authored books. Attending Orientation Programmes and Refresher Courses is mandatory for all the teachers for future promotions (Career Advancement), and they are spared of their duties in the college during the training period.

The college tries its level-best to encourage all those activities required to academically 'recharge' teachers. Some of the measures taken in this direction are as follows:

- Providing leave under FDP for doctoral work.
- Providing study leave for completing specific research work
- The college also allows teachers to attend Orientation and Refresher Courses as per UGC norms.
- The college brings to the notice of teachers each and every research grant, particularly those offered by the UGC. It plays a proactive role in preparing and submitting such proposals.

- The college, as a matter of policy, tries to avail of all opportunities for organizing State/ National Seminars and Workshops.
- The college is positively responsive to teachers' proposals to pursue higher studies/ research work. Such proposals are placed before the Governing Body by the Principal/ TIC after consultations with the Department concerned. In the recent past all such research proposals have been sanctioned.
- The college encourages teachers to attend National and International level seminars.

## 2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

Not applicable. There is no provision for institutional encouragement.

## 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes. The institution has introduced evaluation of teachers by the students through feedback and external peers such as university inspection team, the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal, visited the College for evaluation for all administrative and academic affairs including teachers.

The teachers are evaluated about their teaching and research activities by the subject expert from the University and Officials sent by the Dept. of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal, at the time of their promotion.

The college is planning a feedback procedure on the students' experience of the course of study.

Evaluation is used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process. Such evaluation goes a long way in improving the quality of the teaching-learning process in a sense that a teacher comes to know about his/her strengths and shortcomings and improves his/her shortcomings.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

## 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The Stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty members are informed about evaluation process by giving general instructions mentioned in the prospectus of the institution. The periodic instructions issued by the affiliating university are promptly communicated to the students. The faculty members read the instructions even in the classrooms and copy of the same is also displayed on the

college notice-board. Students are clearly made aware of the eligibility conditions required to appear in the final exams. They are informed of the criterion of the internal assessment. The evaluation is the integral part of teaching learning process. So, the institution makes effective arrangements for the smooth application of the rules about the evaluation processes. The college has developed a proper mechanism for this purpose. Time to time staff meetings are also conducted concerning evaluation process in Teachers' Council and IQAC.

## 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

University has fixed norms and pattern of evaluation. The institution implemented the new evaluation reforms initiated by the affiliating University. To ensure the regular attendance of students college conducts continuous internal assessment system throughout the year. This continuous internal assessment system conducted without notification and marks given by the subject teachers. These marks are added in the University award list.

## 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The University assigns duties and responsibilities in the process of evaluation to the college teachers according to their teaching experience. The College deputes those teachers as leave on duty to perform University assignment connected with the evaluation. Teachers perform their assignment in conducting practical examination or spot evaluation of answer scripts centrally done at the University. According to the seniority, a teacher is assigned duty to be a head examiner or an examiner in the subject concerned. In University examination pattern there are at least five class tests for honours papers and two class tests in a general paper in every session. As per academic calendar circulated by the University, college authority puts forward directives to all concerned departments to implement the calendar and to conduct class test accordingly; it is also requested to the teachers that students have to be given the scope to put a thorough view on class test answers script.

Most of the rules and regulations related to the eligibility criteria to appear in the examination conducted by the University and college mentions in the college prospectus and in the college website. Each and every department declares the percentage of students' attendance and their eligibility to appear before the class test examination begins.

The institution follows the rules and regulations of the affiliating university scrupulously to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation process.

## 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

University is the sole authority for implementation of reforms in examination and evaluation. But faculty members who are a part of academic bodies of the university actively campaign for reforms. Even then for bringing about a positive change in the evaluation practices, the institution adopts both formative and summative methods of evaluation. Formative approach to evaluation such as internal assessment system carries 10% of the total marks of each paper/subject. Two Internal assessments are conducted in each Hons paper and one in General paper.

For summative approach, a three years degree course divided into three parts-Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examinations. Each Part is of one year duration. A student is promoted to next Part after scoring pass marks. The graduation degree is given on the basis of summative evaluation and formative evaluation.

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/ course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The institution monitors the progress and performance of students through classroom lectures and internal assessment method. The institution communicates the progress and performance of students to their parents.

From the above charts presented regarding the students results/achievements for the last four years the following analysis and interpretation are represented separately in respect of Part-I, II and III.

**Discrepancies:** Regarding the discrepancies between the numbers of students enrolled and the number of students appeared in Part I of BA and B.Sc. courses, it has been found that some students left the BA/B.Sc. programme without informing the college and they took admission in other courses like Paramedical, Engineering, Medical, ITI, and Nursing Institutes etc. Although the performance of students during the last four years is not consistently good but the pass percentage of the college is well above the university's percentage.

However, the result of Part-I, Part -II and Part-III students as shown in the chart is consistently good and satisfactory over the last four years.

2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

Sitananda College has a policy to evaluate a student continuously in different aspects during the period of regular session. Vidyasagar University has imposed written class test as an internal assessment and 10% of marks out of 100 is added in each paper at the final examination. Besides, college has made various significant improvements in internal assessment such as attendance, class interaction, field visits for laboratory experimentand home assignments for a fixed duration. In some cultural events organized by the college authority or departments, students enjoy the open opportunity of participation to build up their personality and confidence.

To make a transparent evaluation system, teachers of our college declare marks obtained in the class test and ask students to seek clarification about their doubts if any in the class test. This gives a way to counsel a student for his better progress in near future. On the other hand, the feedback from students enables teachers in improving the standard of evaluation. Besidesthe written test, a teacher also puts stress on their behavioural aspects, independent learning and communication skills through participation in various programmes.

2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teacher use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Regular internal assessment heldin each paper helps to evaluate students' performance. Teaching program and design of lesson plan and curricula developed according to students' performance. Low performers are enrolled for Remedial coaching and advanced learners are provided special care.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The students are addressed individually regarding their performance for internal examinations of the college.

The answer scripts are shown to the students to let them see their drawbacks and mistakes and suggestions are given to improve their performance.

For the University Examinations, the students can apply for review if they are not satisfied with their results. If any grievance is registered in RTI act then the evaluated scripts are produced before them and discussions are made up to their satisfaction.

Assessment is made through the university results and it is announced by displaying in the notice board of the college.

Yes, The College has clearly stated learning outcomes in vision and mission statements in the College prospectus, i.e., synchronizing tradition with modernity. By grooming girls and boys into confident, well equipped, culturally conscious, socially modern and globally competent person, the College translates learning outcomes into reality. The students and staff are made aware of these through the Prospectus.

# 2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the students' results/ achievements (Programme/ course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/ courses offered.

The institution maintains a procedure to monitor and communicate the progress and performance of the students. The procedures are as follows:

- ♣ The institution monitors the students' performance through interactions during lectures in the class room.
- ♣ Special care is taken of the slow learners and academically backward students through remedial and tutorial classes.
- For the assessment of students, the institution takes internal assessment tests regularly. The performance and progress of the students are measured through regular attendance and fulfilment of academic assignments etc.
- Feedback mechanism is followed to justify the students' performance and it is communicated to them.

The following table shows the percentage of students passed in the university examination for last four years.

## 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

Our institutional mission and goal is to impart liberal education to produce intellectually developed, morally upright, socially conscious and spiritually oriented young people who will serve society and the nation; finally to equip our students to meet the challenges of a changing world through pragmatic, professionally oriented teaching.

To demonstrate the skill in their field of study, students enjoy the facilities like sophisticated laboratory as well as enriched library with commendable books and journals in various subjects. Supportive attitude of administration and prudent guidance of faculty members enhance the potentiality of students and concretize the faith and confidence upon themselves. For physical fitness with mental growth and development of students, the college has various facilities on indoor and outdoor games. Students also participate in debate, quiz and various cultural competitions and achieve their potential as well as working towards creating an inclusive learning atmosphere. Students undergo a continuous evaluation system and organize or participate in various academic and co-curricular activities that extend the capturingcapacity, gamut the viability of knowledge sphere and learn how to get adapted with different atmosphere. In case of inability of a student to achieve learning outcome, remedial coaching and counseling classes are adopted to improve the situation.

## 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

In the introductory classes of any course teachers make the newcomer students aware of the social and economic relevance of the courses. Teachers focus on how the study of the courses can be economically and socially significant by explaining the job opportunities and scope in further studies and research work in the subjects. During the courses departments organize seminars / invited lectures to discuss the issues relating to impact of studying the subjects on the society. The college also organizes seminars and talks by experts to emphasize on the prospects of studying different subjects.

## 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

All relevant information of an applicant is collected through the admission form at the time of submission of forms. These data of the admitted students are preserved in the college office. Besides this, at the time of admission to the college other important information of the students is preserved in the office. Record of results of University examinations are preserved in the college office. In this way, the college maintains a students' profile. Departments use these data to study the academic progress of the students of the respective departments over time.

The college preserves all relevant information of students. The academic progresses of the students are analyzed in the meetings of the academic committee, Teachers' Council and IQAC. After discussing and analyzing, proper plans are taken for better performance.

## 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The departmental output regarding the students' performance is regularly discussed in Teachers' Council meeting. The problems are noted and possible outcomes are suggested in the meeting. The concerned department implemented the suggestions and reported the feedback to the next Teachers' Council meeting. The institution advises each and every department to monitor the students' performance through class test examination after covering the each chapter besides the tests of internal assessment prescribed by the university. The Head of the institution always meets both teachers and students of every department regularly to collect feed backs and gives suggestion to ensure the better results and achievement of learning outcomes.

Assessment / evaluation outcomes are indicators for evaluating students' performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. But it is not the only indicator; the teachers' regular interaction with the students in and outside the class helps the teachers to identify the advanced and slow learners.

- The college management with the help of IQAC strives to assure quality maintenance in teaching/learning.
- A number of effective measures have been adopted to assess the performance of faculty to prevent their stagnation and complacency.
- The college has started remedial classes for backward minority as well as career counseling to the stake holders from the session 2015-16.
- Audio-visual mode of teaching (OverheadLCD Projector, Flow Charts, and Laptop) has been introduced. Computers with Internet and Laboratories with modern and advance equipments of Science subjects also have been introduced.
- ➤ The college would like to introduce Post Graduate Courses in Bengali, Sanskrit, English and Mathematics.

The Research Committee of the College is formulated in accordance with UGC XII plan guidelines, representing the Arts and Science streams. The committee always recommends the faculty members to participate in National and International Seminars, Conference and consistently encourages them to present papers on various theoretical and empirical aspects on the concerned subjects. Various departments usually take initiative to organize Seminars/Workshops/ invited speech to create interest on the relevant area among the students. The project report (Minor/Major) is evaluated by the Committee before sending it to the funding agency. Faculty members usually receive research grant from university grant commission (UGC) in the capacity of Major/Minor Research Project Scheme. The Committee holds meetings to discuss various plans and programs to promote research and motivate the faculty for an academic advancement. Hence some of the faculties have completed their PhD while others have already enrolled for it.

## 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

**Autonomy to the Principal Investigator:** At the college level there is no scope of research work for students. Teachers are involved in PhD works orMajor / Minor research projects where the Principal Investigator is given complete autonomy to make easy progress and implementation of research schemes/projects.

**Timely availability or release of resources:** The institutional head usually takes immediate steps to circulate the information regarding research grant funded by UGC. The College

makes all basic arrangements for timely availability or release of resources for smooth progress of research schemes/projects.

Adequate infrastructure and human resources: The College provides adequate infrastructure such as library, laboratory, INFLIBNET N-list facility (Subscription to 6000+ E-journals and 90000+ E-books through N-List and human resources for smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects. The institution has provided aReading Room with Air-conditioned facility for the teachers in the Central Library of the college. Modern equipments like computers with internet facilities have been provided to the Science faculty. Necessary books and journals according to the needs of the faculty for the quality research purpose are available in the Central Library.

**Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers**: The teachers enjoy leaves during the tenure of completion of proposed research work because of two main reasons:

- i) Shortage of staff almost in all departments and
- ii) The institution cannot afford to reduce teaching load for the sake of the students. However leave is granted where and when it is necessary to submit the annual report and utilizations certificate timely to the funding authorities.

**Support in terms of technology and information needs**: Computers with Internet facilities, software as per requirement, Laptops and projectors are made available to the researchers for conducting research work. The departments of Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry of the college have been provided computers with internet connection.

Facilitate timely auditing and submission of Utilization Certificate to the funding authorities: The institutional head takes all necessary steps to monitor and facilitate timely auditing and submission of Utilization Certificate to the funding agencies/authorities.

**Any other**The college authority encourages and extends all possible facilities to promote and update research works in the institution.

## 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and Research culture and aptitude among students?

At the undergraduate college level, there is a little scope for developing scientific temper and research culture among the students. In spite of this, the college encourages inculcation of practical aptitude among students through participation in observational, experimental and empirical exercises. As a part of the curriculum, departments like Anthropology, Botany, Geography, Zoology and Bengali arrange excursion/field works every year. After their field surveys, students prepare their reports of field works or project works under the guidance of the departmental teachers. For this purpose, the college provides sufficient books, magazines, journals of research importance in the college central library and modern equipments in laboratories. This helps in developing scientific temper as well as in increasing interest in research among the students. Students of the College are also encouraged to participate in different scientific competitions. The institution arranges various scientific

programmes such as talk, seminars on International Year of Chemistry, Big Bang Theory etc to develop the scientific temper and interest in research work among the students. The teachers also encourage the students about research by visiting and introducing them with some Scientific Research Institute, Instruments and research works done by them under minor research project funded by UGC. Efforts are on for undertaking major research projects by the different faculties. UGC also grants a large amount of money to equip the laboratories with necessary modern instruments. The College also helps the faculties with water, light, space, rooms and other facilities.

## 3.1.7 Provide details of prioritized research areas and the expertise available with the institution.

### Priority areas for research

The college is located in a rural hinter land. A rich tradition of folk culture is still being practiced in the local environments. This includes *Patuas*, *Chitrakars*, Puppet dance, *Rupban*. Four senior faculties in the Bengali department are actively engaged in research on these folk traditions. Each year the department conducts field work and surveys with the students on this aspects. The history of South West Bengal has a rich cultural heritage. Early history can be traced up to the stone-age. Rich sites are there in South West Bengal of copper-age and iron-age. There was resurgence of National and freedom moments during early-half of 20th century. Faculties of History department are actively engaged in exercising research work on these aspects. Faculties in Sanskrit department are engaged in developing the practice of communicative skill in Sanskrit through '*Barga*' forpracticing communication among the

students and faculties of the department of Sanskrit. Panchayatiraj system is functioning in its optimum form in West Bengal in current years. The system is the pivot of rural development and rural administration at present. The Political Science department is actively engaged in observing, assessing and evaluating the process. South W.B. has a considerable tribal population in its western end. Students and teachers of the Anthropology Department often conduct extensive field work among the tribals like *Santhals, Mundas, Lodhas, Birhors* etc. Some years back extensive field works have also been conducted in rural areas among the peasants. Thus a research base has been developing gradually in the institute for years. The Chemistry Department has faculty members who are involved in interdisciplinary work in collaboration with like minded faculties in other institutions. There have also been interactions with faculties of institutions and Universities abroad (vide infra). Lectures by visiting scientists have been organized by the Chemistry Department to increase the awareness of the students.

## 3.1.8 Enumerate the efforts of the institution in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students?

Our college time to time organises seminars and workshops in order to tie researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students to keep the knowledge up-dated.

Swami Shastrajananda, Principal of Ramkrishna Mission Vidyamandira, Belur visited the college and graced the workshop organized by IQAC on NAAC Awarenes Programme on 24.11.2015 as the Chief Guest.

## 3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

Our college has sanctioned Sabbatical leave for completing the research activities. One faculty member, Prof. Bhaswati Mukherjee has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activity. She visited Bangkok for consulting Musiums there searching Hindu / Indian origin and influence taking Sabbtical Leave.

Dr. C.Basu spent 16 months in Toulouse, France for doing research in the frame of the European Community Fellowship on 'Consortium for Hamiltonian Intramolecular Computing', in 2004.

Dr. L.K.Dolai visited Assam University, Shilchar for consultation with faculties there on RabindraNath Tagore taking Sabbtical Leave in 2008.

The research work investigated by them brought a lot of useful information, books and instruments to the Institution. The information, books and instruments shall be used by other faculty members for their academic development. Hence a research culture is slowly developing in the campus and it will ultimately benefit the students and teaching staff of the College.

## 3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

The institution takes the following initiatives in creating awareness among students and teachers with a focus on the application of research findings in the field of socio-economic advancement and research culture:

- Seminar/Workshops/Symposium/ Special lectures are organized to keep the students and the other members of the institution aware of the emerging threats to the different fields of life.
- ❖ The institution takes an initiative by encouraging the teachers for presenting their research papers at different national and international seminars and conferences. For this purpose, the college provides the facility of leaves and financial help if it requires.
- ❖ The teachers of different departments like Anthropology, Bengali, Geography, Zoology and Botany guide the students in their project works.
- ❖ Teachers and Students sometimes arrange Departmental seminars where the experts of a particular subject of other institutions are invited to deliver lectures for keeping the students updated.

These programmes were aimed to create interests in the minds of young stars to become a good citizen, to be respectful to the martyrs and bloom their love towards the country.

3.It is noteworthy that India is famous for its culture, solidarity and uniqueness from the rest of the world. India is also the birthplace of Sri Rabindranath Tagore, KaziNajrul Islam, C.V.Raman, AcharyaJagadish Chandra Bose, P.C.Roy and many others. Despite of busy academic schedule the institute has never forgotten to bring their importance to the students. On these occasions special days are arranged to commemorate them through informative speeches given by teachers, outside scholars and students. Locals are also invited as listeners.

- 4. During the 150<sup>th</sup> Birth Centenary of Kabiguru Rabindranath Tagore, students of this college arranged cultural programmes with lot of enthusiasm. On 21st February, each year, famous for The International language Day, this was observed to remember the martyrs who fought for their own language. On the birth anniversary of Swami Vivekananda various programmes was also arranged, his vision of life was carried to the students through powerful speeches. The observe RakshaBandhan, the institute also carried out cultural programmes. Students' from outside schools were participated with joy and happiness.
- 5.The institute is always courageous in organizing NSS Programmes. Apart from University Schedule, students' along with coordinators often went to the nearby village to aware villagers about different topics. Such as, Voluntary Blood Donation, Afforestation, AIDS, Thallasaemia, hygienic practices and many others. The students' Union also arranged Blood Donation Camps, Thallasaemia Blood Test and other programmes at free of cost.

Our institution has a number of bodies and cells that work throughout the year to track students' involvement in various social movements/activities which promote citizenship roles. These units are as follows:

- ➤ NSS: The National Service Scheme (NSS) of the institution encourages students to participate as volunteers in various programmes organized by the three units of the college.
- ➤ **TEACHERS-PARENTS MEETINGS:** The Teachers-parents meetings held regularly in general and the departmental meetings are also held with the parents /guardians to know their views and perceptions about the teaching-learning activities.
- ➤ **Alumni Association:** The College keeps contact with Alumni Association for their valuable suggestions. They organised Blood Donation Camps regularly with the help of regular students of the college. They also play a vital role providing feedback.
- Students' Union: The students' union of the College takes participation to track students' involvement in various social activities. With the help of NSS units, they participate in 'Tree Plantation and cultural functions on 'Teachers' Day'. Moreover, the students' union organise various programmes and functions 'RakhiBandhanUtsav', Annual Sports and Games and Freshers' Welcome. All these activities encourage and inculcate the ideal of good citizenship among the students.

- ➤ Committees: Various committees and cells are formed for smooth functioning of the College and adequate representation is given to the Students, local administrative representatives etc. in it. The college has the 'Women Cell and Sexual Harassment Committee', 'Anti ragging cell' 'Sports and Games Committee', 'Cultural Committee', 'Magazine Committee', which work for students' welfare by solving their problems.
- > IQAC receives feedback from the students and other stakeholders and analyses and concludes.

- Documentary videos and photographs of the events like Teachers Day, Freshers' Welcome, Annual Cultural Programmes and so on are preserved.
- 4 At the end of the Annual Sports and other activities, the institution issues certificates to the students who perform well.

  - Some faculties of the departments of our college arrange book lending facilities to the poor and under privileged students from their own collections. The students who are unable to buy books of their own are specially helped.
  - ❖ Under privileged students are highly focused and special facilities are given to them like students' aid fund, poor fund, annual fees concession etc.

### CRITERION IV INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

#### **4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES:**

The main task of our College is to provide quality education which involves a series of programmes and activities. The successful conduct of these programmes and activities depends mainly upon the availability of proper infrastructure in the College. The term 'Physical Infrastructure' stands for the physical facilities of the college. It is referred to buildings, grounds, furniture and apparatus along with equipments essential for imparting education. The infrastructural facilities are very important to the development of any educational institution. Sufficient infrastructure can absorb every bit of new knowledge visible to it. The College building should be attractive, have adequate lighting, comfortable seating, useful service facilities such as multipurpose rooms, classrooms, library, functional playground, filing and storage space etc.

### 4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

For creation and enhancement of infrastructural facilities in the college and for improving the teaching-learning process are chalked out by the Governing Body of the college in consultation with the IQAC, the UGC Committee, Finance Committee and Building Committee. Any infrastructural change in the college is finally discussed inthe Governing Body. It makes a policy to create and enhance new infrastructure and renovate the existing infrastructure. The physical infrastructural facilities are fundamental to the development of an institution. For the last four years our college has enhanced the following infrastructural changes:-

The Administrative Block of the college has been rearranged and modernized with computers etc for enhanced convenience and better performance.

The laboratories of the Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics and Geography departments have been renovated by extending the new space. The Chemistry department upgraded the existing spaces annexing the unused classrooms.

**The Central Library** of the college has been extended with reading rooms for Teachers and Studentswith a view to facilitating improved teaching-learning process.

For the outdoor and indoor games and sports, the college generated advanced and upgraded sports facilities by creating modernized field tracks, well-fostered playgrounds, and building up infrastructure for Indoor games.

#### 4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

The College has provided some limited infrastructural facilities for the students to achieve their goals of curricular and extra-curricular activities.

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities: Small and big Classrooms, tutorial spaces, seminar/conference hall, central/seminar library, technology enabled learning spaces, and laboratories etc.

Classrooms: The College has four blocks – Administrative block, Science Block, Arts Block and KaziNazrul Block. There are twenty three class rooms with all facilities available in three blocks including the departmental seminar hall, and Science laboratories and Math computer laboratory for practical classes. Four classrooms have ICT based audio-visual aids (White screen, Overhead/LCD projectors, Micro Phones and Sound Box) facilities for teaching learning process. Classrooms are well ventilated and adequate sunlight available.

**Technology Enabled Learning Spaces:** The College has a Computer Lab for Mathematics Departments and sometimes it is accessed by the students of different departments. There are four ICT based Class rooms with the provision of Overhead Projector, Visualizer, Audiovisual aids for creating a quality teaching-learning environment. Nine desktops with internet facilities are also available for the use of staff and students in the Central Library.

**Seminar room:** The College has two seminar halls; one is on the first floor of the administrative building with capacity of 150-60 seats and the other is the Physics building used as Seminar/Conference hall with the capacity of over 400 sitting arrangement and with audio-visuals multi-media facilities like overhead Projector, Laptop, and sound system to organize seminars, lectures and other academic activities. At present there is no auditorium.

**Tutorial Spaces:** SmallClass rooms of the college are used as Remedial, Tutorial and Spoken English classes for slow learners.

**Laboratory:** For practical knowledge of the subject seven laboratories have been created at different departments. The Laboratories are used for the conduct of regular practical classes as per the curricula and syllabi for the students. The laboratories are upgraded with advanced modern Laboratory equipment time to time. There are Laboratories in departments like Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology, Botany, Anthropology, Nutrition and Geography,

**Botanical Garden:** The College has a separate Botanical herb Garden. There are some medicinal plants scattered throughout the campus. The students of Botany study different types of plants and various aspects of botanical life that increases their knowledge. The trees and plants of the college campus are marked with their botanical names. Medicinal plants are highly useful to us. Different types of medicinal plants are cultivated in the gardens of the college.

**Animal House:** There is no separate animal house in the college in true sense of the term. But the college maintains the storehouse of animals, reptiles, birds and insects in the preserved form for dissection in the practical classes. Some types of fishes are reared for practical purposes.

Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching:

b) Extra –curricular activities – Sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

**Sports** (**Outdoor and Indoor games**): Three playgrounds are available within the college campus. Students of the college play football, Cricket, Basketball, Badminton, and Volleyball and so on in them. The students of the hostels go there for daily practices. Students' Union of the college organize an inter-class Football Tournaments every year and sometimes Cricket Tournaments. NSS: Three NSS units are functioning in the college. They are highly active and engaged in organizing various types of activities. NSS volunteers clean the college campus regularly. Sometimes they implant the trees within the college campus. Plastic free zone and No smoking zone movements have been launched by the NSS volunteers in the college. The students are motivated to participate actively in the programmes like Health check-up camps and seminars on health problems, blood donation camp, blood grouping, Thalassemia awareness and test organized by the NSS units. The Students' Union of the college organizes numerous cultural ceremonies in which students display their talents. The Annual Social function (including Dance Drama, Bengali and English Drama etc), Debate and Essay Competition, Recitation and Extempore Speech Competition are held every year. Freshers' Welcome and Farewell ceremony of the College are organized by the Students' Union every year on the Open Air Stage of the College. Students of the college prepare wall and annual magazine etc.

Health and Hygiene: Hygiene is a set of practices performed for the preservation of health. Keeping this idea in mind, the college organizes lectures on the importance of health and cleanliness. Regular programmes on Health and Hygiene are organized by the NSS and Health Care Centre committee to generate awareness among the students and teachers about fatal diseases like Thalassemia and AIDS etc. Recently a seminar was held by NSS units of the college on Health Awareness. The college provides purified safe drinking water and big dustbins at different places for garbage disposing. Eight separate urinals and latrines have been provided for students and staff. Boys and girls have separate lavatory. The college sweeper cleans the bathrooms regularly.

- 4 Audio-visual modes of teaching along with traditional methods of chalk, talk and text have been adopted for effective learning.
- ♣ The college website provides all relevant information during admission procedure. The college has introduced online application facility and publication of merit list in admission procedure from 2013-2014 sessions onwards.
- For maintaining transparency and effective governance management, the institution has adopted the application of IT at different academic and administrative levels.

### 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The institution has its mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college. The major functional organs of the mechanism can be mentioned as follows:

- ❖ The institution has a Building Committee to look after the maintenance and repair of the college buildings and physical infrastructure like power supply, purified water, gas etc utilizing the college development funds.
- ❖ Hardware and Software problems of computers are taken care of an employee of the college but for the major repair problems, outside technicians are contracted.
- ❖ The institution purchases the new upgraded computers while non-repairable systems are dumped in storeroom.
- \* Technicians and electricians provide regular service to the institution.
- ❖ Maintenance of lavatory, bathroom, service area and security are done by the permanent staff of the college.

- ❖ Waste water from the campus is recycled for the maintenance of Gardens by the contractual staff.
- ❖ The equipment and other instruments of different departmental laboratories are maintained by the college staff and some time by the contractual members.
- ❖ All wooden items are prepared and repaired by a carpenter on contractual basis.

### 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

The institution has some contractual and daily basis technicians for maintaining computers and networking facilities. Moreover, some permanent non-teaching staff who look after the computers, electrical affairs etc.

- ➤ For maintenance of furniture and equipment, the institutional development funds are used.
- ➤ The institution has Electrician, Hostel caretaker, Generator operator and Security guard etc.
- ➤ The laboratories are maintained through College Development Funds and Grants received from the UGC and State Government.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)? Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the college would like to include.

The institution has specific places for the installation of sensitive equipment like water purifiers, electricity generators, submersible pump, chemicals and scientific instruments etc.

- **♣** The laboratory staff keeps a strict vigil on the maintenance and upkeep of the scientific instruments.
- ♣ The institution has 20 KVA Kirloskar DG set and it is maintained by a non-teaching staff.
- ♣ The institutional electrician and the supporting staff are responsible for the maintenance of electrical equipment.
- ₩ Water tank is cleaned regularly for supply of pure water to students and other staff of the institution.
- ♣ The college maintains uninterrupted supply of electricity during load shedding through DG set.
- → Main Circuit Breaker (MCB) and Earth Leakage Circuit Breaker (ELCB) at prominent power supply units have been installed.

Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the college would like to include:

- Fire extinguishers will be installed in the library, laboratories, office premises and the hostels.
- > One more cycle stand will be constructed because of increasing the number of students and their vehicles.

- ➤ An auditorium building will be founded very soon.
- > The College will introduce PG courses in near future.
- ➤ Napkin Vending Machine, Sanitary Napkin Incinerator and Sanitary napkin destroyer will be installed in the Girls' Hostel and the Girls' Common Room for ensuring their health and hygiene.
- Each and every department will introduce Departmental Library.
- > Staff quarters will also be constructed in near future.

### CRITERIA V STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

#### 5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

A teacher is a friend, philosopher and guide. He is a wise and trusted guide and advisor of a student. It is the duty of a teacher to maximize students' success specifically by developing efficient learning strategies and improving personal motivation.

Our college comprises of students from different and diverse social and economic backgrounds. The college does not provide any financial support to the students directly. Socially and economically deprived students are provided various types of scholarships and free ships. The students coming from other parts of the state are provided with hostel facilities too. After leaving the college, major parts of the students either progress to higher studies or get employment-government or private.

The College publishes its updated prospectus every year and supplies it to the students through college cash counter at the time of admission. The prospectus includes all the necessary information for the students seeking admission into college.

There is an elected Students' Union that actively participates in organization of various cocurricular activities such as various cultural programmes, indoor and outdoor games, debates and competitions, annual sports etc. The Students' Union has representation in various administrative and academic bodies to facilitate smooth functioning of the college. The prospectus contains extensive information about the college and its curriculum, and a recognized Alumni Association which keeps close contact with the authority for overall development of the college.

Yes, the college has been publishing its updated Prospectus annually in hard copy. #### 5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for?

The college provides the students every possible facility and support whenever they need in their pursuit of knowledge and to become responsible and worthy citizens of the nation. The college was set up with a vision and mission of imparting quality education. The facilities provided by the college aiming at the holistic development of the students include:

### Students from SC/ST/OBC and economically weaker sections

Students belonging to S.C /ST/OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) and Minority category get scholarship from state government and some of the economically weaker sections are identified during the process of the admission period. A detailed record of the same is maintained. Students who belong to S.C /OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) receive financial assistance from West Bengal Government as per Government rules and economically weaker students are also provided financial assistance from the college Students' Aid Fund. Some poor and meritorious students are offered financial help.

### Students with physical disabilities

Reservation facilities are enjoyed by physically challenged category students as per Government norms. Financial assistance is provided to them to continue their studies. Special classes are arranged for the physically handicapped students and the teachers take special care in the class. Besides these, routine sub-committee arranges class room in the ground floor for them. Two Ramps and two wheel chairs are provided to them. They are also allowed to bring family member for assistance in the college during the college classes and tests.

### **Overseas students**

We do not have any overseas students as there is no provision for them.

### Students to participate in various competitions/National and International

Information concerning National and International competitions is displayed on the college notice board and is read by the teachers in their respective classes. The students of different departments participate in various kinds of co-curricular activities. These include social, cultural, debate, quiz competitions along with different academic events including Youth Parliament, paper/poster presentations at workshops/seminars organized by college at national and state or district levels. The Cultural committee of the Teachers' Council and the Students' Union ensure student involvement in various programmes held in the college from time to time all the year around. Prize distribution for co-curricular activities encourages students' participation.

### Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

There is no Health Centre or Medical Unit with a sick room or Students' Health Home in the college. If any student falls sick/ill/injury/any health problem, the college authority or the Students' Union assist them taking either to Primary Health Centre, Nandigram or a devoted doctor towards the college, Dr ChittaranjanMaiti who resides 50 metre away from the college. Occasionally free health check-ups are arranged for students of the college and hostels by him and others. A number of Awareness Programmes for improving health and hygiene of students are arranged.

### Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

A considerable number of students are employed as school teachers through School Service Commission. Many students graduating from our college opt for higher studies. The college provides updated information about various job opportunities etc. No coaching facility for NET, SLET, GATE, CAT etc. exists in the college.

### Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The college has taken steps for development of computer knowledge and other soft skills. The Librarian provides User Education for the First year students for learning the use of internet, method of searching books through LAN connected computers from the library. Classes on Communicative English by the English Department are being conducted by English teachers since last six months. Classes on Spoken Sanskrit by Sanskirt teachers have also been introduced. Separate departmental computer laboratories for the departments of Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Anthropology and Mathematics also exist.

### Support for "slow learners"

A Large number of students of this college are coming from very interior villages. Many of them belong to economically weaker sections of the society. Some of them belong to first generation learner. The teachers of different departments identify the slow learners who generally belong to S.C /ST/OBC/Minority category. The College arranges remedial coaching from UGC Sponsored Remedial Coaching Centre and for the other slow learners the teachers of different departments provide extra/special tutorial classes.

### Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/ business house etc

Seminars and workshops at regular intervals are organized by the various departments to apprise the students about the scope of higher studies. Teachers of the departments carefully motivate, inform and orient the students to avail various opportunities concerning higher studies.

### **Publication of student magazines**

The Students' Union publishes its annual college magazine DARPAN to realize their creative writing skills. The magazine is published under the supervision of the magazine subcommittee. The college students very willingly contribute with their articles, self-composed poem in the magazine. The students of some other departments bring out Wall magazines which helps the students to develop their artistic and creative skills.

### **Any other information**

Girls are financially supported under kannysareeprokalpa: The girls are given financial assistance under "Kanyashree Project from the State Government of West Bengal" under the two categories – K1 (between 13 to 18 years) and K2 (between 18 to 19 years).

### 5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The Career Counseling Cell provides necessary information and prospects of entrepreneurship in various fields. Regular interactive sessions are organized with professionals to ignite the students' desire for new ventures.

## 5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

The college encourages and motivates the students to participate in various co-curricular and extracurricular activities. To promote participation of students in various activities, the Sports Wing, Student Union of the College and NSS Units chalk out the policies and strategies. The sports and cultural committee of the college supervises these activities. The necessary facilities are provided and adequate funds are allotted for the purpose. Competitions are organized for all the freshers to display their talent in dancing, singing, debates, elocution, quiz and theatrical skills. For this purpose, the institution avails of the services of the extremely talented faculty.

Additional academic support, Flexibility in examinations: Special coaching classes, remedial coaching & peer learning and guidance, reservation in admission and certification. Participants are exempted from the class tests and attending classes.

Special dietary requirements, Sports uniform and Materials: Special meals are arranged during their practice and performance in competitions

The College provides sports kit with uniform & Sports Material to the students interested in sports like football, Cricket, Carom Board etc. Special jackets and caps are given to the NSS volunteers. Special uniforms are given to those participants who take part in different programme held in the College.

Any other: Scholarships, aids and Free-ships are granted as incentives and concessions by the College authority to participate in competitions. The College also bears the travel expenses of students for their participation in various activities outside the College campus.

5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to thestudents in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

The Career Counseling Cell of the college arranges coaching classes for the preparation of examinations of School Service Commission, Public Service Commission etc. The institution is an Under Graduate college, so it does not offer coaching for NET, SLET and GATE etc. The cell provides information to the students in the matter of employment opportunities and scope for higher education.

### 5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

Academic Counselling:Tutorial and Remedial classes are taken to support the retarded students. For better results, facilities of seminar library are available in the college. The Admission Committee of the college conducts counseling at the time of admission regarding the choice of stream and subjects. Academic counseling is given to the students through various seminars and workshops organized for them.

Career Counselling: Career counselling is conducted by the Career Counselling Cell of the college through meetings and interactions. Teachers and experts from outside counsel the students about the right choice of career and different jobs after they complete their graduation.

**Personal problems:**Sometimes students cannot handle their personal problems due to their immaturity; they approach the concerned teachers of Psychological Counselling Cell and Women's Cell. Students are suffering from inferiority complex and unemployment problems. Personal Counselling offered by teachers has been useful in inspiring the students and solving their problems.

**Psycho-Social Counselling:** The Women Cell invites resource persons from various fields for professional as well as psychological counselling of the student. Students are helped to cope with stress and challenges of life. Modern society creates tremendous pressure on the mind

and body of them. Mental setbacks, Stress-related disorders and trauma are common syndromes that many students suffer in this highly globalized and competitive world. Female students have peculiar psychological problems. They generally suppress and do not disclose. This has an indirect impact on their mind and behavior and this affects their studies.

Sitananda College is aware of its social responsibility. It organizes various awareness programmes for students and faculty members along with the participants of college and counselling cells.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? There is no structured mechanism in the college as such for career guidance and placement of its students. There is no such course of study like BCA or Computer science. But the college has career counselling cell which provides different career and job information.

### 5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? Ifyes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed duringthe last four years.

The College has a "Grievance Redressal Cell" to redress the grievances of the Stakeholders specially the students. They drop their grievances into the complaint Box regarding health services, academic matters, library, financial matters and administrative services. The students are completely free to share their grievances with the departmental teachers and the principal/TIC. All such grievances are discussed and attempts are made to redress/solve the grievances.

### **5.1.11** What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The Governing Body of the College constituted the *Counselling cell, Gender Sensitization* and *Sexual Harassment Cell, Women Cell, Disciplinary Committee comprising* senior teachers to enquire and take actions in cases of sexual harassment. The authority is highly sensitive to the issue of sexual harassment and adopts a ZERO tolerance approach to it. The college has also established *Visaka Cell* following the guidelines of the Hon'ble Supreme Court and the UGC which has started its journey from 2012 for addressing issues related to female staff, students and Gender Sensitization. Students are encouraged to participate in all cultural activities. The Cells and Committees make female students aware of the social responsibilities and give them psychological support to fight against sexual harassment. Fortunately, it is to be noted here that no such case of sexual harassment has yet been reported to the authority for the last four years due to strict vigilance exercised by the authority on the college campus.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any)have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

The college campus is completely ragging free. There is a very warm and cordial relationship among the senior and newcomer students. At the beginning of every academic session, fresher students are made aware of the ragging related rules and regulations through counselling before admission; they are also made to sign an Anti-Ragging Pledge. The Anti-Raging Committee asks the respective departments and the students union to keep the strict vigilance on the students and to report immediately any unpleasant incidents for appropriate action. Fortunately, no instances of ragging have been reported during the last four years.

The former students of the college have come together to form the Alumni Association of the College – 'PRAKTANI'.

The Alumni Association of Sitananda College was formed on25<sup>th</sup> February, 2012. It is yet to be registered. At present; Alumni Association of the college is under the leadership of Professor Sankar Kr Nandi, Associate Professor in Bengali. The Alumni Association is an active body consisting of the distinguished past students of the institution. The members are enthusiastic about the welfare of the College. Many Alumni work as administrative staff of this college like the Head clerk, two clerks in the library and some others. They give their valuable inputs regarding improvement in the infrastructure and administration. The institution requires three things from the Alumni-Time, Talent and Treasure- for the advancement of the college.

## **5.2.3** How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher-level of education and/or towards employment?

Each and every teacher of different departments has well-defined responsibility towards a group of students. The teacher and students meet outside the classes and the students share their academic problems and areas of concerns with their teacher. The teachers encourage and counsel their students to progress their education properly as well as guide them to achieve

higher level of education. Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in various academic programmes held in other institutions. The teachers recommend the deserving students for different scholarships. They also guide the students in making the right choices regarding the future action.

### 5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who areat risk of failure and drop out?

The main factors that compel the students to discontinue or drop out the education are: economic factor and poor educational background. For the solution of economic problem, the institution provides financial support (state/central government Scholarship and institutional Free ships etc) to all those who are financially weak in several ways. Financially weaker students are provided relaxation in tuition fees.

For removing educational backwardness, special care is taken of students who are at risk of failure by providing them special tutorial classes, counselling, provision of study materials etc. The departments arrange additional special classes for slow learners. Teachers at their own level take extra care to such students to cater to their specific academic need. Some students are always found to discontinue their studies due to the socio-cultural and psychological reasons. But the rate of drop out student of our college is very low.

### 5.3 Student Participation and Activities

## 5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

The institution organizes various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities throughout the year. There is full opportunity for the students to participate in different types of outdoor and indoor games and sports. In the present context, the major events of the cultural and extracurricular activities of the College are being discussed.

At the beginning of the session, Freshers' Welcome ceremony is celebrated under the guidance of the Students Union and Cultural Sub-committee of the college. The students arranged Annual Cultural programme in the month of November / December for competition of recitation, quiz, debate, extempore, singing, creative dance and antakshari Competition etc. in which students get opportunity to show their talents and for socio-cultural upliftment.

They also organize annual sports every year to select talented players. Football, Cricket, Volleyball, Badminton, Basket Ball, Carom and Table Tennis etc. are some of the outdoor and indoor games and sports facilities available to our students. Sports like High Jump, Long Jump, 100, 200 and 400 metre running, Discus throwing etc. are also organized.

At the end, Students' Union arranges *Prize Distribution Ceremony* in which prizes are distributed among candidates/ winners who have come at the top of the list on the above games and cultural activities. 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> position holders of each event are awarded prize by the Students' Union.

The College celebrates Saraswati Puja with the active participation of the Students' Union. Every year most of the departments particularly Sanskrit, English, Geography and Zoology arrange their annual cultural programmes.

The students take part in the celebration of the important dayslikeBirth Anniversary of Swami Vivekananda, Republic Day, RabindraJayanti, Foundation Day of the College (21<sup>st</sup>July), Independence Day and National Youth Day (21 Jan), World Environment Day and Teachers' Day. Students also participate in large number of seminars / workshops.

The students play an important role for promotion of an academic environment in the College campus and creating a link between administration & students. The idea is to impart value-based education keeping in mind the cultural heritageof our motherland. It is to educate young generation to meet the challenges of the modern changing society. Apart from this the college instills skill to compete successfully for jobs.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty indesign and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

### ROLE OF THE TOP MANAGEMENT

The Principal is familiar with the spirit of the institution. There are two bodies to frame quality parameters- the Governing Body and the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college. The highest policy making body and the management of our college is the Governing Body. The Governing Body comprises: President, Principal/TIC(Ex-officio Secretary), two University Nominees, two Govt. Nominees, four elected Teachers' Representatives, two elected Non-teaching Representatives, one representative from the localadministrative body and the General Secretary of the Students' Union. The IQAC assists the Principal/TIC in chalking out academic programmes, infrastructural blue prints, and the matters related to the promotion of teachers under CAS (Career Advancement Scheme). The IQAC Coordinator keeps track of all quality related activities of the college and engages in motivating the faculty and students to realize the targets.

In this way, the top management i.e. the Governing Body, Finance Sub-Committee, Teachers' Council, Principal/TIC, Bursar, the IQAC and the faculty members takes a leading role in order to frame policies, programmes, guidelines and to impart quality education. This is achieved through

- Regular meetings with IQAC, the Principal/TIC, Head of the Departments (HODs) and the faculties of different departments.
- Upgrading infrastructural facilities- laboratories, hostels, library, playgrounds and campuses.
- ❖ Developing the Central Library of the college with up-dated/ latest edited books and equipping it with modern tecnological facilities − internet, Wi-Fi, and e-Books and e-Journals through N-List.
- ❖ Attaining the desired target of good academic and administrative atmosphere. For the assistance of various committees along with the Principal/TIC, Secretary of the Teachers' Council, Departmental heads, Bursar, Coordinator of theIQAC, and the General Secretary of the Students' Union is needed.
- ❖ Maintaining all the up-to date records of accounts, cash books, registers and service records etc.
- ❖ Making arrangement for ICT-based classes and making improvements in teaching and learning.
- \* Reviewing the results of the college, and taking appropriate corrective measures for academic improvement.
- ❖ Filling up vacancies in teaching and non-teaching staff of the college
- \* Regular supervision of the financial budget, planning and management and properly managing the college property and funds.

### ROLE OF THE PRINCIPAL/TIC

The Principal/TICis a significant part of the management; he plays a pivotal role in managing the affairs of the college with the direction of the Governing Body and as per suggestion/advice of other Sub-committees. He implements the policies and proposals as directed by the Governing Body. The Principal/TIC communicates the decision of the Governing Body to the teaching, non-teaching staff and students regarding the responsibilities and assignmentthrough letters and the process of circulating notices, office orders, and holding meetings. Any difficulty raised and faced by the Committees is settled cordially in a meeting of the Governing Body. The role of the Principal/TIC is as follows:

- To identify the requirement concerning learning process of the students from backward classes
- **♣** To make sure and certain the quality of teaching and learning
- ♣ To evaluate the performances of the teachers through student feedback mechanism
- **♣** To establish a healthy relationship between students and teachers

- **♣** To circulate information to the teaching and non-teaching staff and students
- ♣ To keep good relations with stakeholders for better performance of the college

The Head of the institution plays the leading role in governance and management of the institution with the help of the staff. He communicates the vision and mission to the faculty and prepares plans accordingly with the help of the Governing Body and other Sub-Committees. The Principal/TIC and the members of the Governing Body regularly evaluate the relationships of the institution with its stakeholders.

## Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

At the beginning of every academic year, the Principal/TIC prepares the agenda based on academic and administrative matters for Governing Body meetings. Different Committees/Sub-Committees and fifteen departments function in this institution for the performance of various curricular and co-curricular activities. All the departments and committees are asked to prepare the action plans for the coming academic year. The Principal then places those action plans before the Governing Body. Ultimately, the Governing Body discusses and takes decisions on these agenda. The Principal is requested to implement the decisions/resolutions adopted on the meetings of the Governing Body. The Principal is also asked for all correspondence on behalf of the Governing Body with the Government of West Bengal, University Grants Commission, the Vidyasagar University and different stakeholders of the College. Finally, the Principal/TIC is to execute the decisions and recommendations by the highest body of the college.

### **Interaction with stakeholders**

Under the leadership of the Principal, interaction with stakeholders i.e. students, parents, alumni, is ensured through regular meetings of the designated administrative and academic bodies, such as meetings of the Governing Body, Teacher's Council, the Finance Committee, the Academic Committee and the IQAC. Students are active participants through the Student Union of the college. They interact with the faculty as well as the Principal regularly, while the parents and Alumni are invited, when there is a need. Apart from the above meetings, with the commencement of the new session, the Head of different Departments conduct Departmental Committee meetings for allotment of topics of the syllabus to the teachers and the completion of the syllabi and other departmental problems.

## Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The institution follows the guidelines of Vidyasagar University, Higher Educationn Council, the Government of West Bengal and the UGC to monitor and evaluate the policies and plans. The institution follows the participative and democratic principles of management. The developmental plans and policies of the college are framed with the consultation of the Governing Body, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and different Committees of the institution. The plans and policies are implemented by the staff and the students of the college. The different bodies review the implementation process and changes for improvement and if it requires, the changes are incorporated in the system. The college forms specific monitoring committees at the beginning of each academic year approved by the

Governing Body. Meetings are convened by the conveners of the Sub-Committees regularlyunder the Chairmanship of the Principal/TIC in order to review the progress, to discuss new ideas and to encounter the problems faced during the implementation of the plans of the institution.

The academic leadership lies with the Governing Body and the Principal/TIC of the college. They have full autonomy to govern the college under the guiding rules and regulations of the Government of West Bengal, the UGC and the acts, rules and regulations of Vidyasagar University. These are financial supporter of the institution to enhance the academic environment. This top management of the college also gets internal support from the IQAC, Teachers' Council and the various academic and administrative committees.

This top management of the institution takes initiative to provide academic leadership to the faculty. These include:

- ❖ The authority forms various committees with specific assignment with the inclusion of teaching and non-teaching staff in it.
- ❖ The faculties are encouraged to translate the action plans for effective teaching and learning process.
- ❖ The faculties are encouraged to ensure interdisciplinary research works in order to receive more funds from the different funding agencies.
- ❖ Those faculties who have not yet completed their Ph. D are encouraged to complete the same by sanctioningstudy leaves. Some teachers are now pursuing research works for enhancement of their professional development.
- ❖ The faculties are given training periodically to accustom themselves to modern technological development.
- ❖ Prof BhaswatiMukhopadhyay of History Department of our collegehas been granted the UGC-sponsored Faculty Development Programme (FDP) for the completion of her Ph. D within the specified period {under 12<sup>th</sup> Plan of the UGC}.
- ❖ The faculties are encouraged to participate in the Orientation Programmes/Refresher Courses to keep themselves update in their respective fields.
- ❖ Teachers are encouraged to apply for Major / Minor Research Projects in order to enhance their academic and professional development.
- ❖ Teachers are also encouraged to organize Seminars, Workshops and Conferences in the institution.

### 6.1.6. How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The quality of leadership management is empowerment, it means giving authority and responsibility to others. A successful leader multiplies his leadership character by empowering others to lead and he can involve others in decision making process. In this way, Faculties, NTS and students are taught values of authority and responsibility to groom leadership.

The teachers of the college motivate the students for creative works that provide them to develop their leadership qualities.

Three NSS units of the college organise and observe various programmes such as the NSS Day, The Republic Day, The Netaji Birth Day, The Independence Day, BirthAnniversary ofSwamiVivekananda, RabindraJayanti, Teachers' Day Celebration, Blood Donation Camp, World Environment Day, College Campus Cleaning Programme, Social Awareness Programmeetc. These programmes play important roles in building leadership among the students of the college.

The Students' Union of our college organizes annual Sports & Cultural Programme where the students show their qualities and talents in sports, dancing, singing, quiz, debates and other cultural skills.

Various committees are formed by the Governing Body for overall management of students admission, distribution of syllabus, conduction of examinations, encouraging cultural activities, maintenance of healthy campus life, and maintenance of service records etc which groom leadership at various levels.

## 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college delegates power and authority to the Departments to work independently. It also provides operational autonomy to them. The head and faculty of Science departments particularly are empowered to develop their departments with the advice of the Principal. Operational autonomy is must for the individual department and modernization and updating are encouraged. Various units of the institution like NSS, Health Unit and Women Cell work independently for the healthy campus life and training the youth towards decentralized governance system. The other committees of the College constituted by the Governing Body work for the management of the admission, smooth conduct of college and university examinations, promotion of research works, development of infrastructural facilities and so on. They work independently for implementing the missions of the college.

The operational autonomy is implemented through various statutory and nonstatutory committees, such as:

- ❖ Academic Committee To plan for effective academic development.
- ❖ **Disciplinary Committee** To oversee and maintain the general discipline, to take care of any occasional hazards and problems involving students and to create an atmosphere where ragging is impossible.
- **Building Committee-** To plan for infrastructural and development work
- ❖ **IQAC-** To enhance the quality and take overall initiatives for developments of the institution.
- **❖ Library Sub-Committee** To look after the alround development of the Central Library.
- ❖ Purchase Sub-Committee To plan for purchasing through proper process and appropriate materials for different departments and for the college as a whole.

- \* Research Sub-Committee To encourage and guide the faculty members for writing research proposals for obtaining grants.
- ❖ Students' affairsSub-Committee To look after various students' affairs like sports, culture, magazines and other things

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Our institution is promoting a culture of participative management and it is reflected through Governing Body meetings, IQAC meetings, Teachers' Council meetings, meetings with Students' Union, meetings at the department levels and the meetings of various committees formed for general welfare and academic enhancement.

### 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

## 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

A good and excellent academic environment is needed in every educational institution and this is the prime objective of our college. The plans of action are developed and initiated by the Governing Body of the college and it takes the whole responsibility of supervising all activities. These are deployed and reviewed with the help of various committees formed for the activities and these are updated through discussions and analysis of its activities. In this way, the quality policy for the development of the college is framed by the Governing Body and it keeps regular contacts with different bodies of the college to remove obstacles in the way of the execution of the quality policy. In order to maintain the quality policy, our college encourages the following activities:

- ❖ The teachers are always encouraged to attend the Orientation Programmes (OPs) and Refresher Courses (RCs) to keep themselves updated. They are also encouraged to organize Seminars/ Workshops/Conferences and to participate and deliver lectures in them to develop professional qualities.
- Our college has installed the Close Circuit Cameras/TV at the important places of the college for security purpose.
- ❖ The IQAC of the college develops new ideas and plans to sustain the standard of education.
- ❖ The college has installed four projectors with sound system in different four rooms in order to use modern technology in teaching learning process and two other projectors are also available in the Chemistry and Mathematics Departments.
- The library has been upgraded with modern facilities like internet, air- condition etc.
- ❖ Students from socially deprived sections of society like the SCs, OBCs and Minority and Physically Challenged categories are being imparted Remedial Coaching classes for the last academic session.
- ❖ Wi-Fi has been introduced in the college and a college Website also has been set up and it is according to need upgraded.

❖ On-line admission system has been introduced and many more programmes have been adopted to maintain quality policy of the institution.

## 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

With the help of modern technology the world is changing rapidly, so to cope with the changing scenario in the field of education and its development, the infrastructural changes and allied development is necessary. The Perspective Plan formulation is indispensible. Considering the above demands, the Management of the college prepares a perspective plan which involves mainly the physical infrastructure, creation of new posts, recruitment of teachers and arrangement of additional facilities.

- ♣ Constructing staff quarters mainly for the lady teachers
- Lensuring and offering transport facilities to the staff and students of the college
- ♣ Constructing an indoor stadium with gallery and modern multimedia facilities
- ♣ Installing SBI, ATM in the college campus
- ♣ Introduction of modern new Science Building
- ♣ Uploading free lecture notes and articles in the web for students


### 6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision-making processes.


and improvement of the institution. Under a democratic set up, any organ of the institution can formulate plans, but the final decision is taken by the apex body i.e the Governing Body.


The organizational structure of the college is given below:

### > Teaching & Learning

Our institution has set up some strategies for the quality improvement like the formulation of future action plans, their execution and evaluation for the advancement of academic enhancement. Teaching learning is the soul of an academic institution, so a mechanism and some strategies are followed for improvement of teaching learning in the institution.

### The strategies are:

- ❖ At the beginning of each new session, the Academic Sub-Committee of the college formulates a general framework of academic activities for the session.
- ❖ A master routine is prepared by the Routine Sub-committee of the college and it is circulated to all other departments to prepare the departmental routine in consonance with the master routine. Then the final master routine is prepared after receiving the feedback and inputs from the different departments. The final prepared routine is followed throughout the year.
- ❖ At the beginning of each new session, the Academic Calendar prepared by the Vidyasagar University is sent to our college, the same is circulated to all Heads of the Departments to prepare a departmental routine mentioning assignments of respective teachers, lecture hours, topics to be taught and co-curricular activities in the departmental meeting.
- ❖ Introduction of modern teaching learning aids like Power Point lesson plans, Overhead Projectors with sound system, white boards etc to make the lecture interesting and effective for general students.
- ❖ Apart from traditional method of class lectures, now student-centric method is adopted and a teacher follows −Audio-visual system, Teaching plan with hard copy materials/ lecture notes for distribution, Projects, Field works, practical classes, Class tests, lectures by experts from other institutions, Internal seminars, Inter-departmental lectures and presentations.
- ❖ Each department of the college reviews the progress of the class students regularly and it is reported in the meetings of the Academic Sub-committee. As the University results are published, the Teachers' Council calls a meeting to make a general survey of the students' outcome and plan a strategy for better performance.
- ❖ The College is developing a Feedback Mechanism for analysis and evaluation to make a better plan.
- For better performance, ICT-based teaching learning proces through Overhead/LCD (Liquid Crystal Display) Projector with sound system, Laptop and internet facilities is stressed.
- ❖ Tutorial and Remedial Coaching for Slow Learners are arranged regularly.

- ❖ For better practical classes, modern well-equipped laboratories are provided in all laboratory based subject.
- ❖ The college library has been automated and updated purchasing new books and journals. The library also subscribes to INFLIBNET NList for advance knowledge of the students and teachers.
- ❖ The IQAC of our college plays an important role in improving teaching leaning process through evaluating the teachers' performance.

### > Research & Development

- For research &development, our college provides well developed library with modern facilities like computer automation through 'SOUL' software, up-to-date printed books andjournals, e-Books & e-Journals through N-List in the reading rooms for students and faculties to continue their research oriented works. The Science laboratories of the college are quite developed having all modern equipment and facilities.
- **♣** The Research Sub-committee encourages the faculty members to write proposals for UGC grant for research works particularly Minor and Major Research Projects.
- ♣ The college has launched a multidisciplinary journal hoping to get ISBN and to encourage publications by the faculties.
- ➡ The Scientists and experts from Cultivation of Science, Jadavpur University are often invited in the Seminars/Workshops of the Chemistry department of the college.
- ♣ The Faculty members of different department particularly Mathematics publish their papers in International and National Journals and books.
- ♣ Dr Ruhul Amin received his Ph D degree in the year 2013 and almost six permanent teachers Prof Biswarup Mandal,Prof BhaswatiMukhopadhyay,Prof NilanjanaNayak,Prof Pintu Das, and Prof SarojMandal- are continuing their Ph D works. Some of the teachers have been provided necessary support/leaves for their research works.

### > Community engagement

- The three NSS units, Women's Cell and Eco-club of the college ensure community participation and organize programmes on the social and environmental issues. Women's Cell makes awareness among women against exploitation and harassment. NSSorganizes tree plantation programmes.
- The original physical infrastructure of the college was established by the local community participation and it is still practicing and attracting the community members to contribute to the infrastructure of the institution. Almost all the statues of the college have been donated by the local community members.
- The three NSS units and the students organizeBlood donation camp, Health and hygiene awareness programme and Campus Cleaning Programmes.
- The Cultural committee of the college develops a good connection with the community by organizing Annual Social Functions, Freshers' Welcome festivity and the students are encouraged to participate in cultural activities.

### **Human resource management:**

- ❖ Our college tries to enhance human resources through recruitment of faculty and non-teaching staff as per regulation of the Government of West Bengal. The authority of the college makes an arrangement for professional development programmes and also supports their skill development through arrangement for training.
- ❖ The authority encourages faculty members to participate in Orientation Programmes (OPs), Refresher Courses (RCs) and some course works etc.
- ❖ The college makes arrangement for the promotion of the faculty members under Career Advancement Scheme and other Professional development programme.
- ❖ Faculty members are encouraged to participate in advanced study, research, participation in seminars/workshops by sanctioning leaves.
- The college also makes an arrangement for staff development programme by enhancing skill development and updating knowledge. The Office staff, particularly the Accountant is engaged in such a programme for accounts maintenance. They are provided facilities to carry out their work effectively.

### > Industry Interaction

✓ Our college has no direct interaction with Industry but sometimes the members from Haldia contact with the faculties of the Chemistry Department for engaging the students.

## 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The head of the institution gathers information for making plans and policies through a certain mechanism –feedback system, personal contact and some other ways. Some of the regulatory bodies of the institution are involved in this process. The regulators are Governing Body of the institution, the IQAC, Head of different Departments and Convenors of different committees and sub-committees. The mechanisms for collection of feedback from the stakeholders are: filling up the feedback form by students, feedback collected from alumni during alumni meet, feedback collected from the parents during departmental parent-teacher meeting. Their advice and recommendations at various meetings of the college enrich the institution through this feedback mechanism for ensuring future development.

The Principal/TIC keeps personal contacts with the stakeholders and collects information with regard to the academic, administrative and infrastructural affairs. Moreover the Principal/TIC is constantly updated about the college affairs through the formal meetings of the Sub-Committees. The members of the management of the institution discuss matters based on the collected information. In this way, the activities of the institution are reviewed and new policies are adopted after in-depth deliberation and analysis.

## 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The college management encourages and supports the involvement of the staff for improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency in academic excellence and infrastructural

development process of the college. The authority of the college motivates the faculty members and the staff to take participation in different activities and decision making process concerning academic, administrative and infrastructural matters. For smooth running of these activities, the college ensures adequate teachers' representation on various bodies of the college. The IQAC, the Teachers' Council, Academic Committee, Anti-Ragging Sub-Committee, Women's Cell, Gender Sensitization Cell, Library Sub-Committee, Counselling Cell etc play important roles in decision making processes and their implementation. Over all the Committees of the college take bold steps for promoting an all-round development of the college and the representatives of committees are free to offer their suggestions or opinion during the meeting with the college management. The suggestions given by the committees are taken into consideration before taking any decision. The Head of the Departments also perform departmental activities as per the guidelines of the college and Vidyasagar University.

The College ensures justice to the students and staff by attending and resolving effectively the grievances and complaints through a "Grievance Redressal Cell". The objective of our institution is to create and enhance a healthy environment for academic development. To resolve grievances concerning academic, financial and health affairs of the students and staff, a Complaint Box is set up in front of the office for collection of grievances and complaints. They can even directly contact the members of Grievance Redressal Cell of the college or put their grievances in the Complaint Box. The members of the Cell analyse the nature and cause of the grievances and then they give their judgement. Generally the Principal/TIC takes the ultimate and final decisions for taking appropriate measures with the help of the Head of the departments and the Coordinator of the IQAC of the college.

The main objective of the cell is to fight for the rights of women and to encourage them to express their grievances and complaints without fear and anxiety.

The institution has a feedback mechanism for analyzing the performances on academic and administrative affairs of the institution. Formal feedback from 3<sup>rd</sup> year students is collected through printed questionnaire form. Secrecy is strictly maintained by the institutional authority. Opinions of the students are analyzed by the TIC and forwarded it to the concerned committee for its recommendation. On the basis of the recommendation, corrective measures are taken for improvements and amendments. For example, students' feedback has helped in installation of CCTV in the campus. Students' feedback also helps in formulating the future plan of action.

Maximum possible efforts are made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff. The scenario of higher education is rapidly changing and the modern scientific technology has revolutionized the communication system and knowledge. So the institute always encourages the faculty members and nonteaching staff for the enhancement of their professional skills. The college management leaves no stone unturned to enhance the academic and pedagogic skill of its faculty members. They are provided "Duty Leaves" to participate in the Orientation Courses, Refresher Courses and other skill development short term courses. Apart from these, the departments organize seminars/ workshops/ special lectures etc to enhance the updated knowledge and the teaching capacity. Faculty members are also encouraged to continue their research works taking UGC Minor/Major Research Projects. Besides, the teachers who have not yet completed their Ph D works are encouraged to complete it. Some of the faculty members are continuing their research works for enhancement of their professional development. At present, one of the faculty members enjoys UGC-sponsored Faculty Development Programme (FDP) under the UGC XII<sup>th</sup>Plan Period for the completion of her Ph D work within the prescribed limited time.

Non-teaching staff are not lagging behind. They are encouraged to participate in the training for basic operation of computer and its application in daily official activities and for updating their computer knowledge. Whenever new software is installed, the non-teaching staff is provided adequate training about its application. For the last few years, some new soft wares were introduced like COSA, CAS, SOUL etc; the institution provides special training to the staff within the campus.

## 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The employees of the institution can perform better roles and discharge their responsibility. The institution has adopted the following strategies for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating.

- Physical and infrastructural facilities are provided to perform better roles and responsibilities.
- ❖ State level Seminars and Workshops funded by UGC or other funding agencies are organized by the departments of the College.
- ❖ 'Duty Leaves are granted to participate in Orientation/Refresher Courses programmes or short term courses.
- Study Leaves are also granted to complete the Ph D works.
- ❖ Faculty members are assisted by IQAC of the college in preparing and applying for Minor/Major Research Project for the enhancement of their professional skills.
- ❖ The Research Committee of the college keeps the record of all the research proposals submitted by the faculty members. Papers are checked and verified by it and ultimately recommended for submission.

- ❖ Special training for skill up-gradation particularly for new software installation is arranged by the college.
- ❖ The College has formed a decentralized structure of the administrative system in planning and implementing all activities of the institution. The system has developed a pleasant atmosphere of cooperation which is a precondition for the all-round development of the institution.
- ❖ Apart from these, the faculty members and other staff are included in the Governing Body of the college and in various Committees so that they can play a significant role in planning and policy making of the institution.

# 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The college has a performance appraisal system for the academic evaluation of the faculty members and it is maintained only in promotional cases. Each and every teacher has to submit self-appraisal reports for each academic session. The teachers have to fill up self-assessment forms to reach at next stage. The papers are submitted before the meeting of the IQAC of the college and its members check, verify and recommend them for the next process. Accordingly the Screening Committee consisting of the Principal/TIC, one DPI nominee and one Vidyasagar University nominee evaluates the performance of the teachers by checking the papers and ultimately recommends them for the placement/promotion at next stage. If there is some necessary correction is needed, the committee suggests rectification. Ultimately the Governing Body of the college has to sanction and approve all the promotional matters and forward them to the DPI for fixation.

# 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? Howare they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The management of the college makes an assessment of the feedback forms of the students and the performance appraisal forms of the teachers. After assessment of these forms, the authority comes to know the positive and negative aspects of the faculty members/office staff. Generally the positive suggestions are provided to the concerned teachers/office staff for better performance with commitment. If the authority finds some negligence in their duties, then corrective measures and disciplinary actions are taken for the overall development of the institution. They are communicated properly and negative points are not propagated for maintaining the secrecy of the administration.

# 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and nonteaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The college has adopted some welfare schemes for the teaching and non-teaching staff. Welfare schemes of the college are as follows:

- ♣ The college provides salary payment in the first week of every month from the college fund even if the college has not received the pay-packet on time.
- ♣ The authority of the college provides Festival Advance on the eve of Puja Vacation to some employees.
- ♣ The college has adopted Gross Provident Fund Scheme (GPF) and Group Salary Life Insurance Scheme (GSLI) for all its employees (T & NT) appointed in the substantive posts.
- ♣ The college provides Loan facility from Provident Fund and from Banks for House Building Loan.
- ♣ Various kinds of leaves are given to its employees as per University and Government rules Casual leave/ Medical leave/ Maternity leave/Compensatory leave/Special leave/Study leave/Duty leave etc.

## 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Our College is a Government Aided college which is guided by the rules and regulations of the West Bengal College Service Commission. The college has no right to recruit teachers. But at present the Government has given some relaxation in the matter of appointment of invitee teachers who are paid from the college fund. In this regard, the Governing Body/the institution may take various measures for attracting and retaining eminent faculty. Apart from these, to enhance the quality of teaching learning programme at undergraduate level and for better academic performance of the college for the benefit of the students, the concerned department invites the eminent scholars from various universities and research institutes to deliver lectures on relevant topics. Some of the measures for attracting and retaining the faculties are as follows:

- ❖ Attractive Honorarium is to be provided with the assurance of job.
- ❖ Academic and conducive working environment may attract the faculty.
- Provision for holding Seminars/ Workshops/special lectures etc for up-to-date knowledge may attract the knowledge loving faculty and facility for advance study or research is another reason for attraction.

### **6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**

## 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

❖ The college has a mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources. The Finance Committee, a statutory body, is constituted by the Governing Body of the college as per Vidyasagar University Statutes. Its members take major decisions on financial matters as per Government rules and regulations. They prepare an annual budget for both academic and infrastructural development of

- the college and also prepare plans and proposals in consultation with Bursar, Accountant and some senior faculty members headed by the Principal/TIC.
- ❖ Plan and Non-plan are two kinds of Government budgetary allocations. During each five year plan, the college applies for grants as per the UGC Schemes for developmental works of the college. The UGC developmental grants are allotted on proposals submitted by the institution after exhaustive deliberation about the needs of various plans of the institution.
- ❖ The long-term developmental plans of the institution are academic and infrastructural such asequipments for laboratories, books for library and so on. The Principal/TIC, Bursar, Accountant and the Finance Committee closely monitor income/expenditure of the college.
- ❖ Quotations and tenders are called for from the license holders and suppliers before the purchase of any important items for the institution in order to verify and compare the prices. The entire procedure is regulated by the Finance committee, Building Subcommittee, Purchase Sub-committee of the institution. But the Principal/TIC is the sole authority to utilize the financial resources and issue a utilization certificate.
- ❖ The regular audit (internal and external) of the budget is an important check and balance system for the expenditure and the maintenance of financial transparency.

## 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the majoraudit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

All accounts of the college are maintained properly and updatedregularly through institutional audit mechanism. The college has a mechanism for internal audit if any controversy arises in the Governing Body it may recommend to the DPI office for internal audit. But such cases have not arisen in our college till the date.

The college has a mechanism for external audit too. The external audit is carried out by a Government appointed auditor from auditor panel as per the provisions of the West Bengal Government Rules &Vidyasagar University Act. It is the duty of the Governing Body to contact the authorized Chartered Accountant of the West Bengal Government who along with his team conducts external audit regularly as per the financial rules of the WB Government and the UGC. The external audit of the college has been completed up to the financial year 2014-15 and the audit report has also been received. No objection was raised by the auditor. The audit of 2015-16 is going on.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/fundingand how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of institutional receipts/funding are as follows:

- Frincipal/TIC as a disbursing officer may disburse the salary of the employees of the college. The authority may also use for payment of telephone bill, land taxes, electricity bill, printing materials, stationary goods, traveling allowances for educational tours, maintenance of equipments of laboratories, furniture repairing and maintenance etc. The other grants under State Plan are utilized for purchasing of Chemicals, Equipments and Glassware for laboratories, Books and Journals for library, Furniture for the institution, Sports goods for students and so on. Some amounts are kept for contingency payment. The Departmental Heads and the Librarian of the college convene a meeting called by the Principal/TIC for allocation of funds for fulfilling the requirements of the departments.
- Fees collected from the students as tuition fees/session charge are allocated for cocurricular activities like inter-class competition, invited lectures, cultural functions, college magazine, Annual sports etc.
- ➤ Grants received from different funding agencies like the UGC for holding Seminars/Workshops, conducting Minor/Major Research Projects and for other developmental works.
- ➤ Donations/Contributions from the stakeholders are received for any kind of development of the institution. All statues of the college campus are collected from donations.
- Frants received from Haldia Development Authority (HDA) have been utilized by the Panchayat Samity Nandigram-1 for the construction of external boundary wall, internal roadsb and drains of the college.

Summary of the audited Income-expenditure statements of the last 3 years 2012-13, 2013-14, 2014-15 are given below and 4<sup>th</sup> yeay, 2015-16 is going on. Please refer to, Annexure VI-IX

## 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The College authority and the faculty members pursue the local business men, wealthy people, philanthropists and the leaders for raising fund for the institutional development. The institution itself evolves mechanisms to make arrangements for additional money. In addition to these, proposals are placed to the State Government, the UGC and other funding agencies for additional funds for the college development.

The grants received from different agencies have been fully utilised

**6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)** 

**6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)** 

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was formulated by the Governing Body of the College in the year 2012 as an administrative unit and advisory body for quality sustenance and enhancement of the institution. Receiving inputs from the faculty members, non-teaching staff, students and other stakeholders, the state and central government, the UGC, the University, the issues are discussed in details in the Teachers' Council, Academic Committee and then sent to the IQAC. In the case of Career Advancement Scheme, the candidates place their proposals before the meeting of IQAC to check, verify and recommend it for further proceedings.

The IQAC of the collegehas slowly developed a quality assurance mechanism within academic and administrative system. For example, it supports to conduct Seminars/workshops, awareness programmes etc.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved bythe management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

Generally the recommendations provided by the IQAC are considered and approved by the management, the Governing Body and implemented. Some of the quality enhancement recommendations made by the IQAC are mentioned below:

- Promotion cases of 10 faculty members
- Renovation of students' lavatory
- Installation of CCTV network
- Installation of Wi-Fi in the college campus
- Full computerization and automation of the college Office
- Modernization of laboratories of the college
- All above recommendations have been approved by the management and implemented.

## c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes. There are at present three external members in the IQAC of the college.

- 1. Prof Manoranja Jana, Ex-Bursar, Ex-TCS of Sitananda College
- 2. Prof Tanweer Alam Mazhari, Associate Professor in English, RKM, Belur, Howrah
- 3. Sri Swapan Kr Sasmal, a qualified librarian of MugberiaGangadharMahavidyalaya

They sincerely attend each and every meeting of the IQAC and offer their valuable suggestions for quality improvement of the college. Whenever they are invited to attend Seminars/Workshops held at the college, they attend these programmes without fail.

### d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

At present, there is no representation of regular students or alumni in the IQAC of the college.

### e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC of the College meets at regular intervals and interacts among the members on the issues of academic and administrative quality enhancement. The decisions taken in the meetings are communicated to the Head of various departments and directions are given to them for implementing the rules framed. From time to time, the IQAC members meet and attend the meetings of various committees of the college to communicate about the strategic plans and policies of the IQAC. Feedback is taken from them in different formats and it is forwarded to the Governing Body through the Principal/TIC of the college for taking final decision.

## 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The college forms a number of Committees and Sub-committees which are given responsibilities for academic and administrative betterment. Their functions are monitored by the management like the Governing Body, the IQAC, and Teachers' Council. The management makes suggestions regarding academic and administrative matters to the authority and total management works in unity to achieve the common goals of the institution.

## 6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The institution provides formal training to the staff for effective implementation of quality assurance procedures. Our college administrative staff was trained to run the COSA software smoothly. When the Central Library of the college was modernized with SOUL software, the trainer from Vidyasagar University was called for to train the Librarian and library staff for its operation. Time to time, the staff of the college are sent to attend the seminars/workshops for attaining updated knowledge of computer.

## 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are theoutcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The college undertakes Academic Audit as per the guidelines of Vidyasgar University. The college provides required information in the prescribed format supplied by the Vidyasgar University for reviewing the performance of the faculties/institution. Academic audit is made to review the results of the students for identifying the shortcomings of teaching learning process. Low, average and high performance of students are marked and special attention is paid to them for improvement of performance. Tutorial and Remedial coaching classes are provided to the academically weaker students. In addition to these, the IQAC keeps contact with the faculties and the last year students for collecting feedback which are finally analyzed and processed to know the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges. This

mechanism helps in decision making process for academic environmental improvement. Some other significant measures are taken into consideration like emphasis on the completion of the syllabus in time, the attendance of the students, academic results, arrangement of special classes etc.

## 6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The college is regulated by different regulatory authorities like the affiliating university, the UGC and DPI. In this way, it follows all university rules and regulations, the UGC guidelines and DPI instructions for maintaining standards in teaching-learning process. The college conducts examination and its evaluation and it also receives grants from these agencies for many welfare schemes after fulfilling the required eligibility criteria determined by these agencies. The college also conducts academic and co-academic programmes as per the University Calendar.

## 6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- The college has a mechanism to continuously review the teaching-learning process. The Vidyasagar University prepares Academic Calendar displaying a detailed layout of the teaching plan. The plans highlight the contents, time schedule for completion of the chapters and the name of the faculty members. The University sends it to the affiliated colleges. The Principal/TIC circulates it to the departments and the HOD prepares their teaching programme accordingly.
- ➤ Learner-centric approach is followed.
- ➤ The Principal/TIC regularly meets the Head of Departments and takes feedback for rectification in teaching learning process.
- ➤ Role of IQAC: The IQAC of the college keeps vigilance on the progress of quality teaching.
- ➤ Use of modern techniques like Audio-visual mode of teaching, ICT based learning.
- ➤ Meetings with the students and their parents for taking feedback regarding teaching learning progress.

### 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

Our College communicates its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders like teachers, students, parents, alumni and society through:

- Ceremonial observance of significant days
- Notification through the website of the college: www.sitanandacollege.info

- Meetings of the students, parents, alumni, Governing Body, Teachers' Council and so on
- ♣ Publication of detailed information in the prospectus of the college
- Submission of reports to the Vidyasagar University, State Government, DPI, UGC, NAAC etc
- Meetings of IQAC of the college

Any other relevant information regarding Governance Leadership and Management which the college would like to include.

The TIC, Bursar, Faculty members, Librarian, Coordinator of IQAC, Non-teaching staff and Students Union play significant roles in academic and administrative fields. Our college administration follows democratic principles and the authority empowers the sub-committees in decision making process of the college. The institution creates leadership at different levels of the administration.

## CRITERIA VII INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

Our college has not yet formed an eco-club, but the college undertakes various plans and programmes concerning Environment Consciousness in the college campus. There is no formal mechanism for Green Audit in the college but the process of Green Audit is going on. However, the Institution takes all possible steps to make the campus eco-friendly. The college campus is heavily planted with fruits plants and varieties of flora and fauna. The use of plastic bags is avoided in the campus and the authority is planning to declare the entire campus as "No Plastic Zone' from July 2015. The entire campus is a no-smoking zone. The students and staff has planted more than 100 tree saplings during various tree plantation programmes organized by the institution and all these trees are taken care of and maintained by the institution.

## 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the Institute to make the campus eco-friendly? Energy conservation

The college class rooms are naturally well lighted, airy, ventilated and rarely require electric light. The institution and the departments strictly observe to see that no electric equipments run unnecessarily. In order to reduce electricity consumption the classrooms and corridors of the college have been provided with CFL/LED bulbs in place of the traditional tube lights and bulbs.

The College inculcates a spirit of energy saving in all stakeholders, particularly among the students. Thus enough measures are taken to use electricity carefully.

### **Efforts for Carbon neutrality**

The College at its own level has taken up certain preventive measure to check the emission of carbon Dioxide. Regular plantation of trees is undertaken by the Institute for the carbon neutrality. The use of coal as fuel in the canteen has been banned and replaced by gas. This helps in keeping the campus as much as possible clean. In order to reduce pollution and unnecessary wastage of vehicle fuel the College does not allow two wheelers by students on campus. The Institute is set in a green landscaped ambience and every year around more than 100 trees are planted. The entire campus is covered with many big trees, especially Mehogini, *Sal*, Mango, Guava, Plum, *Jamrul* and *Neem* trees.

#### **Plantation**

Under the supervision of the Gardening Committee of the College, some interested teachers often organize tree-plantation & maintenance programmes within the campus. These planted trees are maintained carefully by the college authorities. The college campus is lush green with heavy plantation of fruit plants, flowers, hedges and medicinal plants. The NSS units of the college constantly encourage and enlighten students about the benefits of plantation.

**Rain water harvesting**:Rainwater harvesting is an innovative alternative water supply approach. Implementing rainwater harvesting is beneficial because it reduces demand on existing water supply, and reduces run-off, erosion, and contamination of surface water. Rainwater can be used for nearly any purpose that requires water.

### Hazardous waste Management and E-Waste Management

The authorities of the College have arranged and constructed deep pits in the unused places for the disposal of hazardous wastes and e-waste created by chemical sciences and computer department. Waste chemicals in the chemistry and zoology laboratories are properly disposed by dissolving them in water or by keeping separately in protected sheets. Electronic waste, such as office electronic equipments, discarded computers and refrigerators are disposed off as per their conditions or handed over to the companies engaged in recycling of e-waste.

### **Other Activities:**

- I. The College authorities organize seminars & lectures on contemporary environmental issues to increase the environmental awareness of the students.
- II. The college organizes regular Scientific Exhibition and Environmental & health awareness seminar in collaboration with Cultivation of Science, Jadavpur University
- III. The NSS units of the college hold debates, talks and quiz on different issues regarding environment.
- IV. The college Students have participated in poster presentation on water management.
- V. The college Students actively participate in public health programmes like control of AIDS, polio awareness programme of Thelasemia and so on.

#### 7.2 INNOVATIONS

## 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

**Use of ICT:** The Department of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Geography and English regularly use LCD projectors provided in different halls. Besides these, some Science faculties have been provided Laptops and pen drives. The faculties can also avail the net facility in their respective departments. All relevant information is available on the college website <a href="www.sitanandacollege.info">www.sitanandacollege.info</a> through which students are highly benefited during admission time. All relevant documents can be preserved and tracked readily for administrative works. The college has built an e-class room where various statelevel and national-level seminars are conducted to the advantage of the students and teachers alike. Automation of the Central Library is already completed and working.

**ICT enabled teaching and learning:** The different departments of our college have adopted modern trends and methods in teaching-learning process using computers and audio-visual aids parallel to the classical system of lecturing using chalk, talk, and text method. For this purpose, the departments are provided with desktop and laptop computers with internet facilities. Some departments use specific software as required by the curriculum especially mathematics and Chemistry.

**The College Study Circle:** Senior teachers and the Teachers' Council of the college organize an Interdisciplinary programme -- **Study Circle** for Faculty members to present research oriented papers. The Papers presented in the Study Circle are published in an edited volume.

**Feedback System of the College**: The College has introduced feedback system to enrich quality education and faculty improvement. Regular third year outgoing honours students give their Feedback on the performance of teachers, the college and the departments. Students give the feedback about the teachers at the end of each session. The feedbacks from the students are obtained teacher-wise and course-wise. The model questionnaire is prepared according to the guidelines of the NAAC is used as a model to prepare the feedback form for this purpose. These feedback forms are analyzed by the IQAC and it gives the evaluative report teacher-wise to the Principal. These analyzed evaluated reports are persuaded by the Principal. The outcome of the evaluation and its analysis are communicated to the individual teacher for his/her understanding of his/her strength and weaknesses. This is made only for future improvement and encouragement of the teachers and enrichment quality education.

Computerization of the Administrative Work: The college administrative block has been fully computerized with internet facilities. Some of the administrative staff have been properly trained to understand the technicalities and to run the daily activities of office through computer.

Sanskrit is a classical language and it has millions of documents which keeps vast knowledge on different subjects. Keeping in mind the importance of heritage of Sanskrit language the college conducts classes for spoken Sanskrit. Now they can organise drama and seminar in Sanskrit language. In modern age English has become an international language and the importance of English as a global language of communication, the College has started Communicative English classes on a regular basis. It encourages the students to develop their communication skills in English.

The Department of Political Science has initiated news reading classes to create and develop awareness among students about local, state level, national and international news. The news reading habit becomes a test of their communication and presentation skills. It makes the students aware of what happens in the world as a whole.

**Improvement Cells:** Career Guidance Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Sexual harassment cell, Women cell, Anti-ragging cell and Counselling cell have been introduced.

**Audio System in the big classrooms for Teaching**: Audio facilities have been provided in all big classrooms in the college.

**Computerization of the Central Library**: Library functioning has improved after library automation and installation of OPAC.

Our college has introduced Remedial Coaching Classes for the students of Minority particularly poor and financially week students. For this the UGC has provided sufficient grants for extra classes. The college teachers are highly interested in it.

Competitive examinations for entry into Government and Non-Government services, our college has initiated Coaching classes for the minority student particularly poor and financially weaker section. For this purpose, the UGC provides sufficient grants for extra classes.

### 7.3 Best Practices of the College: Students' Feedback

Goal: The institution tries to improve the quality of the students and the institution. It has formulated new programmes to enhance the quality of both. The main goal/objective is to know about the requirements of the students for their all-round development. To fulfill this goal, the institution has to some extent developed its own system of inviting feedback from the last year students on various aspects of the institution. A questionnaire is prepared for receiving answers from them. The past and present results also guide the college authority in taking decisions to improve the quality of the students and the institution.

### The context:

The institution requires quality improvement and different measures for quality assurance & enhancement. An effective feedback system is necessary for future planning and policy. For this the institution had to create favorable environment. The college has initiated this proposal since 2015-16.

**The Practice**: The College has planned & implemented 'Feedback concerning environment of the institution' on such aspects as:

- 1. Academic
- 2. Administration
- 3. Canteen

#### 14. Suggestions for development of the departments and the institution

The college prepares students' Feedback format in Bengali & English language for giving their observation on institutional, academic, administrative and some other extra –curricular activities. The students give their suggestions about the current state of affairs and indicate necessities for future developments. Without knowing the strengths and weaknesses of the institution, one cannot formulate a better developmental policy. Through feedback system, the students offer their opinion on academic, administrative and infrastructural aspects.

**Results**: When we receive the filled up feedback forms, the authority convenes departmental meeting to discuss on the matters mentioned in the forms. For detailed discussion it is referred to the Academic Subcommittee and the IQAC of the institution. These bodies analyse the feedback of the students and the suggestions are recorded.

Consequently, the authority of the institution takes measures and strategies for quality assurance & enhancements. As per the suggestions of the students, some innovative works have been done. The Office of the institution has been renovated and extended. The Central Library of the College has been upgraded by extending reading rooms for the teachers and the students. Laboratories of different departments have been extended and provided with modern advanced equipment. It is to be noted that as per the suggestions of the students the College is going to open P G Courses in Bengali, English, Sanskrit and Mathematics. A canteen and purified safe drinking water have also been provided. Two playgrounds are prepared for the students. Hence, the feedback system is fruitful and beneficial to the development of the institution and students

**Problems:**At the initial stage, whenever the students were asked to fill up the feedback forms, they were hesitant because they did not know the rationale behind it. They did not understand the weaknesses and problems of the institution. These are the problems faced by the institution.

The teaching staffs apprise and describe the students the rationale behind filling up the feedback form. Knowing the problems, the authority convenes meetings with the students of the College and with other committees and cells. The Principal/TIC tries to explain the feedback system and its importance. The authority has made it compulsory for the students to fill up the feedback forms. The third year students are askedto fill up the forms compulsorily otherwise they would not be allowed to fill up the form for final examination of the Vidyasagar University. With these strategies, the authority has overcome the problems.

Note: the Feedback System helps the institution to take decision and make plan for the future action.






